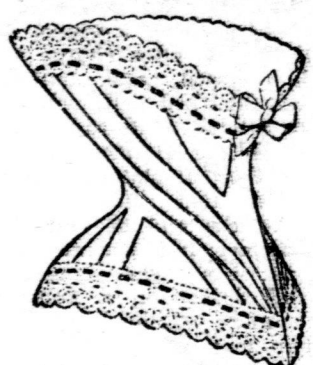

TO SPREAD LIGHT THROUGH WORLD

International Convention of Young People's Missionary Movement Begins.

Pittsburg, March 10.—With 3,500 persons, representing thirty-two nations, half of that number being delegates from all parts of the world, the first international convention of the Young People's Missionary movement convened here today in the music hall of the Pittsburg exposition.

The convention represents 14,000,000 persons, and is one of the largest gatherings of the kind ever held. Judging from the sessions today it will also be one of the most successful.

At a session held tonight in Exposition Hall, three miles of moving pictures, illustrating the mission fields of the world were shown for the first time. At Old City Hall and several churches throughout the city, overflow meetings were held.

The devotional exercises were in charge of Rev. Dr. John Willis Baer, president of Occidental College, Los Angeles, Cal., who will also preside during the convention.

One of the interesting announcements made today was the plan for holding the sixth world's Sunday school convention in Washington, June 4 and 5, 1910. This convention will represent 25,000,000 persons in more than 50 countries.

Addresses were made by C. C. Michener, of New York, general secretary of the Young People's movement of the United States and Canada; Rev. James I. Vance, Newark, N. J., on "The Resurrection Gift"; and on the foreign missionary movement by Kenneth MacLennan, Great Britain; Rev. J. L. Gerdine, Korea, and Rev. Arthur H. Bwing, of India.

The programme for tomorrow includes five 25-minute addresses on North America, South America, Africa, Southern Asia and Eastern Africa. In the afternoon native Christians from Korea, Japan, India, and China will speak.

HUNTERS WON'T GET SKIN OF REYNARD

Judge Decides They Were Trespassers on Farmer's Property.

St. Catharines, March 10.—"No man has a right to venture a foot on another man's ground against the owner's will, without being liable for an action for trespass. If the property is inclosed it is a criminal act and may be so pressed."

That's how Judge Wells of Welland decided the famous fox case and dismissed the action against Farmer Bailey of Crowland Township. Around Christmas time, Bob McQueen and George Hill, two local hunters, started a fox, and after wounding it in the leg the sly reynard escaped by taking refuge under the barn on J. Bailey's farm. The farmer chased the hunters off his place when they attempted to poke the fox out, so they brought suit against him for \$250, the price of the fox skin.

The point involved in the suit, as emphasized by plaintiffs' counsel, was whether or not a man who had shot a fox was entitled to it. He read authoritative law to show that the law gave a man the right to an animal he had started on one man's property and killed on another man's.

"But these men only wounded the fox," suggested Judge Wells. His honor, then, throwing aside all questions of who was or who was not entitled to the body of the fox, eventually cinched the case for the defendants by quoting the law with reference to trespass upon another man's property.

"The case is dismissed," his honor announced. "The plaintiff could not legally claim the fox on another man's property."

It transpires that the fox was a tame one used to belong to Charles Eastman. After the two hunters had gone Bailey caught the animal and fled it up, but it escaped subsequently and is now in parts unknown.

COOL BURGLAR AT THOROLD

Holds Up Woman Alone in Her Home and Rifles House.

St. Catharines, March 10.—Last night about 9:30 at Thorold Mrs. Clarke, the wife of former Police Chief Clarke, of that town, was seated alone in the front room of her home reading when the door suddenly opened quietly and a man walked into the room. He had a revolver in his hand. "Keep quiet and stay where you are and I'll not hurt you," he said to Mrs. Clarke, and when she showed no disposition to disobey he went through the drawers of all the furniture in the room in a search after money. There was only \$2 in the room, and this he took. He left the house, first however, warning Mrs. Clarke not to leave her chair until he got away.

Swift Vengeance.

Bristol, Va., March 10.—Swift vengeance was meted out to Jackson Presler, a young married man, who was taken from his home near Swords Creek, Russell County, in spite of his wife's appeal, last night, by a mob of 300 men, and hanged to a tree. George Calland John Hunter were murdered at a dance Saturday night, and it was charged that Presler was implicated in the killing. Thomas Gross and Fred Dye, young men also charged with being implicated in the double killing, were arrested Sunday, and hurried to the Lebanon jail, twenty miles away, in order to prevent lynching.

WILL UNCLE SAM PUNISH CASTRO

Congress to Decide as to Whether Venezuelan Insult Shall Be Wiped Out.

New York, March 10.—A Washington special to the Tribune says: That Venezuela has treated this country with grave discourtesy not to say contempt, will be evident when the correspondence between that country and the United States is made public, as it will be when the department of state forwards to the senate the papers called for by the Lodge resolution. In fact, it is probable that senators did not realize the extent to which they would be embarrassed by the publication of the facts when they passed the Lodge resolution. The department of state has made every possible effort to observe courtesy, to say nothing of justice, from the Castro regime, and the secretary of state now admits that he has done all he can, and that the further disposition of the case rests with congress.

According to the view taken at the state department this country must deliver an ultimatum and follow it up or supinely submit to treatment from Venezuela, which would be the occasion of immediate reprisals were it offered to a European nation. And yet there is a grave question if it would be wise or profitable for the United States to undertake to administer chastisement. It is a serious question if popular approval would greet the application of force. It is equally questionable if the United States could gracefully undertake the unpleasant task in view of the work this country, and especially this administration, has been doing to promote international peace. And yet ask officials, is it the wish of the people or the judgment of congress that the Government should supinely submit to contumacious treatment at the hands of a Southern American dictatorship? This is precisely what the administration expects congress to answer—the problem which it will soon be up to congress to solve—and it was to that end that the secretary of state suggested to Senator Lodge the advisability of introducing his resolution.

EXPLORERS FALL OUT

Grave Dissension Reported Amongst English Antarctic Adventurers.

Christchurch, New Zealand, March 10.—The barkentine Nimrod, which sailed from New Zealand early in January, with Lieut. Shackleton's Antarctic expedition on board, has returned here, bringing a tale of dissension in the exploring party. Lieut. Shackleton attempted to take charge of the ship one day when she was in a dangerous position. This was resented by Capt. England, sailing master of the Nimrod, who promptly knocked the lieutenant down. The Nimrod left the Shackleton party encamped at the foot of Mount Erebus, a point they reached with considerable difficulty on account of the ice.

On account of the trouble on board Capt. England has resigned, and the Nimrod will return for the Shackleton party in December, without him. It has been necessary to give up the extensive magnetic surveys in Antarctic waters, planned by the Nimrod's crew.

MOTHER IS BEST CITIZEN

So Says Roosevelt at Opening of Mothers' Congress at Washington.

Washington, March 10.—The White House was the scene today of the formal opening of the first international congress on the welfare of the child, which is being held under the auspices of the National Mothers' Congress. The two hundred delegates representing all the states and territories and a dozen or more of the leading countries of the world were received at the White House this afternoon, when President Roosevelt delivered an address to them.

"This is the one body that I put ahead of the veterans of the civil war, because when all is said, it is the mother, and the mother only, who is a better citizen even than the soldier who fights for his country."

"I abhor and condemn that man who is brutal, thoughtless, careless and selfish with women, and especially with the women of his own household. The birth pangs make all men the debtors of all women."

"But the woman who shirks her duty as wife and mother is just as heartily to be condemned. We despise her as we despise and condemn the soldier who flinches in battle."

"With the girl, see that it is not made a matter of mirth that the girl who goes to college comes out unprepared to do any ordinary duty of womanhood."

"No school is a good school if it has not a good playground. Help the children to play, and remember that you can often help them most by leaving them entirely alone."

Henry J. Duveen, who not long ago paid more than \$50,000 for the famous Rudolph Kann art collection, began life as a blacksmith. Mr. Duveen was one of a number of young Dutch Jews who left their native land for England. Emigrating to Hull, he followed his trade, and at a blacksmith, for some time, but soon his faculty for getting on asserted itself. He went to London and became associated with a Holborn firm of jewelers, educated himself and mastered every detail of his work. Eventually he and his brother established the business in Bond street which has become famous all over the world.

Japanese For Peace and Prosperity

New York, March 10.—Ambassador Takahira's address before the Japan society in New York tonight was notable from the fact that it touched upon Japan's enlarged influence on a small portion of the Asiatic continent, to her treaty with Great Britain, "our honored ally," which was concluded "purely and simply to secure the peace, and, therefore, the prosperity of the Far East," and to the question of immigration regarding which he declared that he was able to say that "while we have to maintain our rights in all respects, there are now between the United States and Japan no questions of any magnitude likely to remain unsettled much longer."

Touching then upon the question of Japan and Japanese affairs Mr. Takahira said:

"Japan's enlarged sphere of influence by no means," the ambassador said, "necessitates any change in the general policy of the empire. Japan's will and purpose as a nation are always the same." The ambassador recalled a speech he had made at Philadelphia five years ago on the position of Japan in the Far East, and in this connection said:

"I remember I said then, among other things, that 'the sincere desire of the Japanese Government and people was to have all neighboring countries realize that mutual interests can best be promoted by the maintenance of peace, the promotion of commerce and industry and the strengthening of the ties of interdependence.'"

"It is not meant by this that a race coalition should be formed hostile to the interests of other countries."

"My meaning simply is that a country to be truly prosperous should have peaceful and prosperous neighbors. That naturally leads to interdependence, not politically, but socially and commercially, and establishes the surest guarantee of peace to all concerned."

"Today, after five years since the delivery of my address just referred to, I do not see any reason for the necessity of modifying what I said then. The only difference you may have noticed in the position of the countries, as it was then suspected in some quarters, Japan has entered into a treaty of political interdependence with a nation of your kindred race and of the same creed. I mean, of course, Great Britain, our honored ally. But this treaty was concluded purely and simply to secure the peace and, therefore, the prosperity of the Far East. It has no ulterior aim."
