# IS CHATHAM CHARGE

Man From the States Arrested by the Maple City Police.

[G. N. W. Dispatch.] Chatham, Sept. 29.—Frank Smith, aged 33 years, was arrested at the C. P. R. Hotel at 2 o'clock this morning charged with passing a forged \$10 check on W. G. Hannen, of Miles Hotel. According to the charge Smith Sat-urday bought \$4 worth of goods from the Stone Company, tendering a \$10 check, apparently signed by John Johnston, a farmer, of Harwich. Though the check was irregularly made out Stone cashed it.

He then, at Smith's request, showed the latter how to fill out a check properly. Smith took the check filled out by Stone, and went to Miles Hotel, where he ordered supper and bed, giving Stone's check in payment, and taking the balance in cash. His arrest followed failure to return that night. Smith claims to come from Aurora, Ill., and Batavia, N. Y.


