

HURL 36 TONS OF EXPLOSIVE TWENTY MILES INTO DUNKIRK

Germans Bombard the French Town Fifteen Hours, Killing
Some Civilians and Doing Material Damage—
Military Points of Importance Untouched.

DUNKIRK, France, June 23.—(Via Paris, June 24.—2:20 p.m.)—Thirty-six tons of explosives and metal were fired into Dunkirk yesterday from the German positions somewhere behind Dixmude. Several civilians were killed or wounded and considerable material damage was done, but not a single shell reached the port or any other point of military importance.

The impression on the inhabitants differed in no way from that made by preceding bombardments and the first train of the city today carried no more than the usual number of travellers.

The first shell struck in the city at the break of dawn and others followed at intervals of 25 minutes until a quarter past six in the evening. They came without warning, for, though Dunkirk constantly hears the guns of the Allies along the Belgian front no sound comes from the monster weapons that hurl these 16-inch shells from a spot more than twenty miles distant. The shock of the shell gives no warning of the missile's coming, as the noise is heard only in the last two hundred yards of flight and almost simultaneously comes an explosion that makes the earth tremble.

RUSSIANS ABLE TO HOLD THE GERMANS FROM WESTERN LINE

Petrograd Correspondent Says Their Fighting Power Is
Unimpaired—Heavy Forces of the Enemy Are
Concentrated On Dniester Front.

LONDON, June 23.—3 a.m.—A dispatch to the Times from Petrograd says that owing to the unimpaired fighting power of the Russian army, the Austro-Germans will be unable to transfer troops either to the Warsaw or the western battle fronts.

"As yet," the correspondent adds, "the retirement from Lemberg has not affected the Dniester front, where modifications are likely to occur only if the Germans succeed in advancing eastward, thus threatening the Russian rear and flank. It is affirmed that the enemy has concentrated on the Russian front all the Austrian cavalry, some eleven divisions, and almost all the German cavalry, namely, four divisions, but that their activity is not very marked."

A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Petrograd says: "Although the buildings in Lemberg were left intact, the engineers effectively destroyed the roads behind the retreating Russians. The rear guard corps were brilliantly handled and gained invaluable time by delaying the Austro-Germans four miles northwest of Lemberg and also to the west and southwest of the city. The new Russian front which was referred to in Wednesday's official communication as the point on which the Russians were retreating, is on Galician territory."

"The Retch says it thinks the Russian army accomplished everything that was possible with its available resources."

RUSSIANS HOLDING BANK OF DNIESTER

Fight Stubbornly Against Enemies' Attempts at Capture.

BERLIN (via London), June 24.—A further victory for the Austro-German forces in Galicia was announced today at army headquarters. The army of General Von Linington, which has been meeting with stubborn opposition from the Russians along the Dniester River front, has succeeded in crossing the river. The statement says:

"Northwest of Kuznets the Russians left more than 100 prisoners in our hands after an attack which we repulsed. On the Omulek River (Russian Poland) the German advance resulted in the capture of the village of Kopaczewsk. South of the Vistula in Poland several enemy attacks were frustrated."

"Southwestern theatre of war: The army under general Von Linington crossed the Dniester between Malicz, which is still being held by our enemies and Zurenow. This army engaged in a fierce battle on the northern bank."

Canada Temperance Act Will
Cut All Licenses Save
Stratford's.

31 HOTEL BARS TO CLOSE

Milverton a Surprise; Verdict,
Instead of Adverse, Is
Favorable.

STRATFORD, June 24.—Perth has spoken and by a substantial majority declared itself in favor of no license.

The Canada Temperance Act, submitted today, carried by a majority, which official figures placed at 211.

As a result of today's vote some 31 hotels and a half dozen shops will be closed throughout the county within a year.

The vote was heavy in all districts as was expected.

South Waples, Logan and Ellice went almost solid against the measure and among them rolled up a vote only 201 less than the other municipalities.

The majority against the measure in Ellice was 366, in Logan 225, in South East 135.

Fullerton, Downie and Blanchard, all of whom had been under no license, gave big majorities for the measure, while Elma, another local option township, also gave a fair, favorable majority.

Milverton, however, was a surprise. In place of a large majority for the wets, as was expected, the temperance forces won by 23. Much credit for this is given Dr. J. L. Gordon, the Winnipeg orator, who recently conducted a campaign there. Stratford being a city, is not affected by today's vote but there is talk of bringing on a local option campaign in the city.

NEW TEMPERANCE LAW IN SASKATCHEWAN NOW

Legislation Given Third Reading Before
Prorogation.

REGINA, June 24.—With thumping of desks and parliamentary "cheers" the Government's temperance legislation was this evening, in the dying hours of the Saskatchewan Legislature session, given a third reading, and is now law. The bill was given third reading after division. The Lieutenant-Governor formally prorogued the House tonight.

GERMANS KEEP CARGO.

AMSTERDAM, June 24.—According to the Handelsblad, the prize court at Hamburg in its judgment in the cases of the Dutch steamships Zaanstroom and Batavier V., which were seized by the Germans in the North Sea in March, declares the Zaanstroom confiscated under the terms of the Declaration of London, more than 50 per cent of her cargo being contraband. The Batavier V., according to the newspaper, is ordered released, less than half of her cargo being contraband.

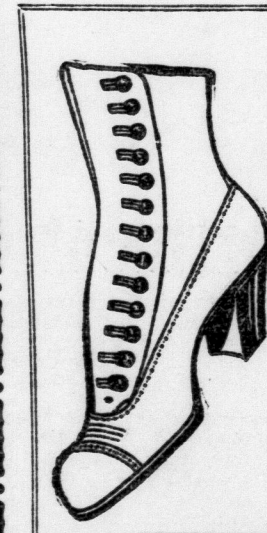
