Austrian Soldiers Are Entering Rumania
Rome Hears State of Anarchy Exists Throughout Hungary.
[Canadian Press.] London, July 8.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Rome says: A message from Bucharest states that many groups of Austrian soldiers with arms and equipment continue to arrive in Rumania, where they are interned in a camp at Dobruja.

These fugitives state that the armies of Gen. Pflanzer-Baltin are reduced to a few remnants without artillery, and that the remnants of Transylvania refuse to furnish food to the troops and are leaving the wounded to die. The authorities are impotent in face of the anarchy to which the country is a prey.

OTTAWA DISPATCH SAYS 110TH GOING TO BE ALSO MOVED

To Go to Camp Borden After Monday Next.

THIS WOULD LEAVE TWO Yet Dispatch States It Is Expected Four Battalions Will Remain.

The heat, Sam Hughes and a few other things have all played their part in adding much to the present camp situation in London, if a Canadian Press dispatch from Ottawa is any indication.

This dispatch states specifically that the 110th (Perth) Battalion goes to Camp Borden after Monday's election. It also states that four battalions in lead of three, as ordered, will remain here. Just where the four battalions are going to be secured is something that officers at district headquarters do not know. They say they know nothing of the reported move of the 110th.

One More Change.
Originally the 110th and the 111th were slated for transfer. This was later changed, the 168th and 169th being substituted for them. If the Ottawa dispatch is correct, then the 110th goes also, leaving only the 111th and the 169th here, unless further last minute orders come through.

EXPECT FOUR LEFT.
Ottawa, July 8.—As a result of representations made to the militia department the 111th Battalion of North Perth, now in camp at London, will be moved to Camp Borden until after the North Perth elections on Monday. This is to give the members of the battalion an opportunity to vote in the election. It has been announced that the battalion, with others from the London camp, would be moved to Camp Borden in time for the opening of the election.

William Gray, M. P. for London, is in the city to urge the minister to leave as many battalions as possible at the front. A deputation of London's citizens is with him. It is expected that four battalions will be left at the London camp.

LIEUT. BRIGHT OF 153RD SUCCEUMS TO SPINAL MENINGITIS Stricken Suddenly at Home While on Leave From London Camp.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Mount Forest, July 8.—Lieut. Harold Bright of the 153rd Battalion died at his home here early this morning with startling suddenness. The doctors pronounced the cause of his death as spinal meningitis.

Lieut. Bright came home from London on Thursday on military business and appeared to be in his usual health until that night, when he complained of a pain in his head. On Friday he was kept quiet, but was able to converse readily. The news of his death this morning has caused a distinct shock to the community, for Bright was a splendid specimen of clean young manhood and beloved by all. He was in his 20th year and only a few days ago was granted his matriculation on account of his military standing. A year ago he took his lieutenant's examinations, and when he enlisted with the 153rd last January obtained his commission. Later he qualified for a captain. His parents and sister have the sympathy of all. The funeral will be a military one.

25 FIRMS, AGAINST DAYLIGHT SAVING, PETITION COUNCIL Say Scheme Has Been Detriment Instead of Benefit.

A petition against the daylight saving bylaw was presented to City Clerk Baker today and will be considered by the legislation committee. It is signed by 25 wholesale houses and firms. D. H. Howden & Co. circulated it, and explained in a letter that all the persons signed the petition willingly and without compulsion. Had there been more time, a large number of signatures could have been obtained, was one declaration.

The petition declares that the scheme has been given a three weeks' trial, and it had been found to be a detriment rather than a benefit. Were the scheme universal there would be no complaint, say the petitioners.

Daylight Savers Supporting More
It is stated that a petition signed by at least 3,000 names will be presented to the council shortly in favor of the daylight-saving proposition.

The employees of the McClary Manufacturing Company are favorable, and a large number of business houses, particularly the retail, like the contractors. The petitions will be ready next week.

TWO MEN STRUCK BY AUTO; NOT BADLY HURT

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL THE LOCAL MARKET

There was a fair-sized market today and a good crowd of city people turned out. Several changes in prices were noticed, particularly in strawberries, which were quoted at 13c and 14c retail and 12c wholesale. The demand for strawberries was small, but the supply brought in was small and the berries themselves were small.

Vegetables were plentiful and prices, in the majority of cases, were firm. Carrots and beets dropped to 40c flat.

The local market was firm and steady today. Trade was not so great as last week, but the buying was good. The exporting branch of the local market was active, though little new business was reported.

Demand in the cash market was very good for both wheat and oats, with premium for the former.
