

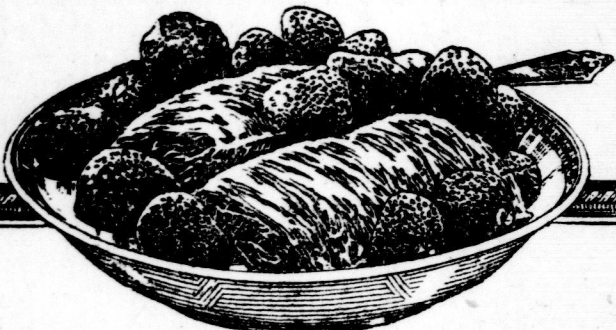

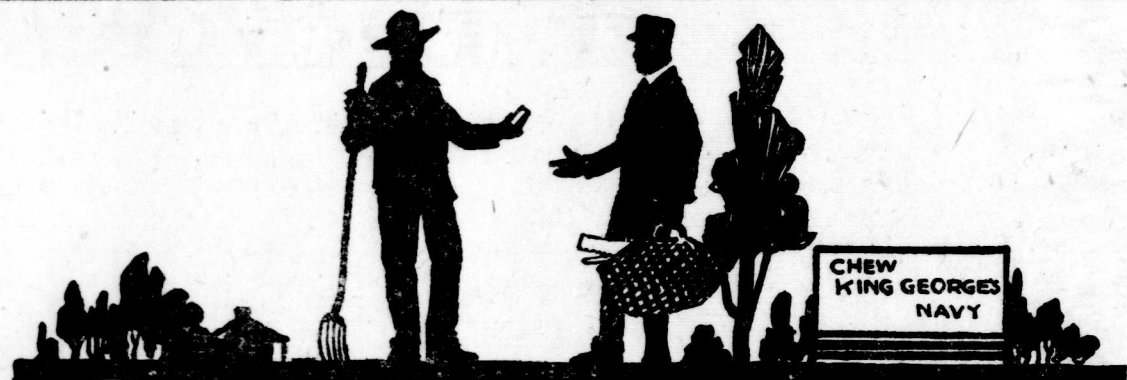

FEAR LAD WAS MURDERED BY ANGRY WOMAN

Body of Missing Detroit Boy
Is Found in Ditch.

MRS. LEWEN ARRESTED

Alleged To Have Threatened
To Kill Child and His
Mother.

DETROIT, May 16.—The search for
6-year-old Max Ernest who disappeared
from his home, 8015 Windermere
avenue, last Wednesday afternoon and
who was believed to have been ab-
ducted by a woman, ended shortly be-
fore dusk tonight when two boys out
on a dandelion picking expedition found
the child's body lying in a deep ditch
about 70 feet off Avondale avenue on
the east side of the city.

The body was half covered with rag-
weed, only the little shoes protruding.
Examination seems to indicate that the
child was strangled to death. There
are finger marks about the throat, in
one little hand was found a long white
hair.

Was Boy Murdered?
Mrs. Elizabeth Lewen, 60 years old,
arrested Friday on suspicion of being
implicated in the boy's disappearance
is white-haired. The discovery of the
body bears out the police theory ad-
vanced yesterday after a thorough
combing of the city, that the child
was dead and that his death was not
due to natural causes.

The lady who discovered the body
are Frank Dittman, 12 and his brother,
Roy, 14. They at once reported their
find to the police, who took charge of
body and had it removed to Wayne
County Morgue. There were many
splashes on the clothing and marks of
many bruises about the body. Identifi-
cation was established by a birth
mark on the forehead as well as by
the clothing. Near where the body
lay was a hobby-horse, one of those
toys that boys love.

With the exception of the long strand
of white hair in the child's right hand,
there is nothing to indicate how he
was brought to the place where he
was found or whether he was murdered
first and carried to the spot later.

Many links already connect the Le-
men woman, who is also known by the
name of Mme. Le Grande, with the
Ernest boy's disappearance, but al-
though subjected to many quizzings
the woman has steadfastly adhered to
her story that she knew nothing of the
boy's disappearance.

Had Threatened Both.
Chief of Detectives Edward H. Fox,
late tonight received information that
Mrs. Elizabeth Lewen had threatened
the life of the child and his mother.
This information was volunteered by
a credit man employed by the J. L.
Hudson Company. He told Mr. Fox
he had become acquainted with Mrs.
Lewen several weeks ago while she
was attempting to purchase large
amounts of merchandise from the store
on credit. He had several conver-
sations with her, he said.

"Last Monday night," he informed
the chief, "I was eating in a lunch
room. Mrs. Lewen was in the place.
She approached and said she had a
gun. She said the boy's father Frank
Ernest had played a dirty trick on
her, by ejecting her from her home
fellow avenue house, and that she was

going to Ernest's home that night and
kill Mrs. Ernest and the little boy.
I tried to dissuade her, but she
persisted in her determination to 'get
even with that family.'"
"She said she would kill the mother
and child if it took all her life to do
it."

Chief Fox is withholding the name
of the credit man. He says his infor-
mation is important enough to
justify serious consideration.

MYSTERY FIRES AT KINGSVILLE TO BE PROBED

Oil-Soaked Blanket Found in
Home of P. Golden Arouses
Suspicion.

KINGSVILLE, May 16.—Some de-
cidedly interesting developments may
follow the visit to Kingsville of the
provincial fire marshal to investigate
the series of fires which have occurred
here since Saturday noon, causing
losses that will total nearly \$300,000.
The first blaze was in the Brown
Woolen mill, which was completely
destroyed, with a loss of \$300,000. This
was followed by the burning of Bon
Jasparsen's big barn, where the loss
was \$15,000. Last night the large barn
of P. Golden, who first noticed the
fire in the Brown mill, was burned.
This morning his ice-house was de-
stroyed by fire. A little later it was
discovered that an attempt had been
made to burn his house, where the loss
was \$15,000. In an unoccupied
room a quilt was found that had been
saturated with coal oil and set
on fire. There were several holes where
it had burned through, but had burned
itself out.

It was stated to The Advertiser to-
night that a young home girl in Mr.
Golden's home will be very closely
questioned regarding the fires at Mr.
Golden's. It is stated that she was
first one to call attention to the fire
which destroyed the barn last night,
and that she knows something about
its mysterious origin.

In the meantime the arrival of the
provincial fire marshal is awaited,
and a close watch is being kept in the
hope of preventing any more fires.

VETERAN TRUCKMAN CAME FROM WINGHAM

John Hillen Fell From Truck
in Detroit and Died
Instantly.

WINDSOR, May 16.—John Hillen,
better known as "Jack," died as he
would have wished to die—in harness.
The veteran truckman, who had been
employed by one company for 42 years,
fell from his truck at the Griswold
Hotel in Detroit and died instantly.
Hillen came to Detroit from Clinton,
Ont., in 1879, and took employment with
a Detroit omnibus line. His first job
was to drive a four-horse stage coach
that met all trains at the old Washburn
depot at the foot of Twelfth street.
Later, when the city became larger and
each hotel demanded its own bus, he
was stationed at the old Russell House,
which stood on the site where the
Ponchartraine was built many years
later.

There were no electric cars when
Hillen started driving, and only a few
horse carriages. Automobiles were
known once, it is related, his em-
ployers bought an automobile truck and
turned it over to him. He made one
trip with it. On arrival at the Michi-
gan Central station, he said "Whoa,"
but it didn't "Whoa." The next day
he was asked for his old team and had
constantly refused to drive anything
but horses.

Hillen was born in Wingham, Ont.
He was married to Mary Farrell of
Windsor, shortly after he came to De-
troit. Besides his widow, those surviv-
ing are four sons, John, Joseph, James
and Samuel Hillen; four sisters, Mrs.
Jennie Hoffman, Mrs. Katherine, Mrs.
Annie Wallace of Goderich, Mrs. Mar-
garet Ober of Sterling, Ala., and Mrs.
Lizzie Walker of Clinton, Ont., and
two brothers, Robert and James of De-
troit.

SHAW MAY TRY TO MAKE ESCAPE INTO MIDDLESEX

Youthful Robber Eludes Police
At Bothwell After Hot
Chase.

CHATHAM, May 16.—Claude Shaw,
the youthful bandit who was captured
near Bothwell after a hard tussle, ap-
peared before Magistrate Arnold in the
county police court this afternoon on
four charges of robbery, to all of which
he pleaded "not guilty." He was re-
manded to the county jail.

Orville Shaw, his brother, has not
as yet been captured. He troked to the
home of his grandfather in Bothwell yester-
day. The chief constable of Both-
well was notified that he was in town,
and assisted by several Kent County
patrolmen surrounded the house. Orville
broke through the curtain, and after an
exciting chase eventually gained the
wood, where, it is understood, he has
cached a generous supply of food, where
he can withstand a long siege.

Orville has an advantage over the
police, in that he is familiar with every
nook and corner of the woods in which
he is in hiding. How he eluded the
patrolmen patrolling the edge of the woods,
and also the police in Bothwell, is a
mystery to the police, as it was believed
that he could not escape from the drag-
net which has been spread over most of
Zone Township. It is believed that he
will make an attempt to get into Mid-
dlessex County. If this is done he may
be able to make a clean getaway.

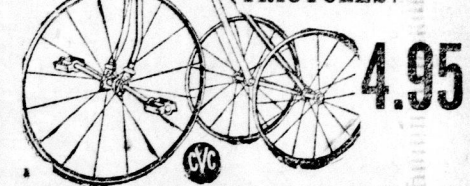
