Dr. F. C. Routley Addresses Hippocratic Society of Western University.

ASKS REGULATION

Says Man Who Was Bricklayer Yesterday Can Be Chiropractor Tomorrow.

That under existing Ontario statutes, any man is eligible to become a chiropractor within a very short time, without any previous educational requirements being laid down, was the declaration of Dr. F. C. Routley of Hamilton, secretary of the Ontario Medical Association and editor of the Ontario Medical Journal addressing the Hippocratic Society of Western University at the Medical School Thursday night. Dr. Routley stated that medical men of the province are determined that chiropractic practitioners in the province be regulated similarly to physicians and that the Ontario legislature is being urged to draft rules governing their conduct.

GRANT TO WESTERN ASSURES EXPANSION

Latest Vote of \$400,000 Makes Certain Completion of Building Program.

MAINTENANCE LOW

Col. Brown Says \$50,000 More Is Required To Meet Needs.

In supplementary estimates brought lown yesterday in the provincial house, a grant of \$400,000 for building purposes and \$200,000 for mainten ance is recommended for the Western Interest of the board of governors

of the university centers around the grant of \$400,000, for this sum makes up a total of \$800,000 received from the province towards the new university buildings, and meets in full the request made by the university more than a year ago, \$400,000 being eceived from the government last year in two grants of equal propor

Receiving \$400,000 this year will assure the completion of the building program mapped out for the time being by the university board. This brings the total for money already in sight up to \$1,100,000, sufficient to erect the main building, containing the administration office, the library lecture rooms and non-laboratory classes; and the science building, providing for work in physics, chemistry biology, botany, zoology and geology.


