

LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

ON A CHARGE.—Charles R. Walters, pleaded guilty in the Police Court yesterday to supplying spirits to Indians. The accused said he had been taken up for assaulting an Indian who had refused to supply with spirits about three weeks ago, in consequence of which he had been thrown out of work, and being reduced in funds had adopted this as a means of replenishing his exchequer. He entreated the clemency of the court. The police did not give the accused a very good character, and the magistrate in consideration of his being the first conviction sentenced Walters to pay a fine of \$250 or to suffer six months imprisonment.

MASTHOLEY ACCIDENT AT LANGFORD LAKE.—Mr. Mark Corbin, merchant, of this city, was most unfortunately drowned yesterday at Langford Lake under the following circumstances. About 50 or 60 men, who were on their way to the lake to enjoy a picnic in that picturesque spot, the party partook of lunch between one and two o'clock, after which they resumed, and while this was going on Mr. Corbin left the company and went to the water edge where some boys were bathing. He then appears to have taken off his clothes, entered the water and swam out to sea. The middle of the lake. Shortly afterwards the boys noticed that he had disappeared but did not seem to have been apprehensive of danger, and did not join the rest of the party for about half an hour, when they related the circumstance to a few of the party. There was nothing in the shape of a boat or canoe on the lake, and although some friends went into the water they failed to detect the missing man. Shots were raised, and fancying that they heard a reply further search was abandoned, and the seekers returned to the festivities. The missing man, however, did not appear, and the alarm then became general. On returning to the lake the party found the clothes still lying upon the bank, and it was evident to them that the unfortunate man had met with a watery grave. Information was at once conveyed to town, and several friends of the deceased left during the evening for the lake, taking with them a boat and grapnels to endeavor to find the body.

VOLUNTEER COMPANY NO. 2.—A meeting of the members who have enrolled themselves to form Company No. 2 of the Volunteer Rifle Corps, was held last evening in Smith's Building. Mr. Seely occupied the chair. Capt. Lang offered some information on the result of an interview he had had with His Excellency as regards the proposed modification of the oath of allegiance with a view to the admission of foreign gentlemen. His Excellency personally would be very willing to accept the proposition, but stated that he had not the power to do so without instructions from the Home Government and suggested that these gentlemen should in the interim be drilled in the regular way, and they should be supplied with Government arms. The Chairman was anxious on behalf of those who had been most active in the movement to disclaim any intention of holding office as seemed to be the opinion of some of those whom they had canvassed. Capt. Lang also took occasion to disclaim on the part of No. 1 Company a like intention. Tuesday next, the 15th, was appointed for the first drill. About 40 members have at present joined. Mr. J. Judge Cameron refused the order on the ground that the security having passed into the hands of the assignees could not be transferred.
