Mr. E. S. Crauford, assistant general agent of the Union Steamship Company on the Pacific coast, received a cablegram from Howolnah announcing that the Maanka called there on Tuesday night. After a short stay at the Hawaijan port, she continued her voyage, and when she left she had 421 passengers on board.
