The St. James was on her way from San Francisco to Puget Sound in bal-last to load lumber for the California port, returning after taking a cargo from Port Ludlow to the Golden Gate, Port Ludlow to the Golden Gate, she arrived on Dec. 22. How she got into the dangerous position from which the Orion rescued her is unknown; probably she drifted there which the Orion rescued her is unknown; probably she drifted there during fog with the landward swell following the southerly weather of the past few days. Had the gale been still prevailing when she brought up her anchor off Danger Rock, there would have been slim chance for the safety of the vessel. The place is considered one of the most dangerous of that treacherous coast.

The rock is in the southeast part of the entrance to Middle Channel, widest of the three main entrances to Barkley Sound, that body of water being 14 miles wide and 12 miles long, 30 miles to the westward from the entrance to the Straits. Middle Channel is 3 1-2 miles at its widest part, and has three dangerous menaces near its entrance, Danger Rock, Western Reef and Channel Reef. The amount of salvage in such a case is usually left to the admiralty courts for decision. There have been some notable salvage cases in consequence of the rescuing of vessels from going ashore on the Vancouver Island coast, and whenever they are discussed by local ship ng men the talk always veers to that of the steamer Commonwealth. This vessel, a large 6,000-ton iron freight steamer, was found by the Willapa off Sidney Inlet, with her tail shaft gone and in distress, holding for the mean vith one anchor down. The captain and crew had left the vessel in the boats and were at one of the coast villages. When the Willaps found the vessel, instead of placing any of her own crew on board, the master sought the missing crew and again towed the vessel into a safer position, and

a powerful steam tug was sent from Victoria to bring the vessel here for repairs. The salvage bill was a small one; but it might have been very large, had the master of the Willapa taken possession of the abandoned steamer. A Seattle court gave \$53,000 to the steamer Walla Walla some years afterward for picking up a British sailing ship which had been abandoned by captain and crew off the Washington coast. coast.

WILLIAM JOLLIFFE LEAVES

Tug William Jolliffe, a powerful steamer which has been used in long-distance towing, with headquarters at Liverpool, and which was purchased at a cost of \$75,000 for the B. C. On arrival the tug will be placed in service in conjunction with the B. C. Salvage company. The Jolliffe is a large ocean-going iron screw tug of \$32 tons, built at South Shields. She has two funnels, and treat bunker space having capacity great bunker space, having capacity for fuel enabling the vessel to remain for tuel enabling the vessel of reliable at sea for 35 days. The William Jol-liffe is a few feet shorter than the tug Lorne, but is more powerful than that fine steamer. The dimensions of that fine steamer. The dimensions of the vessel are: Length, 149 feet; breadth, 26:2 feet, and depth, 14 feet. The two cylinders of the vessel's engines are 30 and 60 inches in diameter, with a 30-inch stroke. The speed of the tug is fifteen knots.

The Jolliffe will proceed to St. Vincent, and will coal there. Other ports of call at which the tug will coal will be Montevideo, Coronel and San Diego.
