FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL

Councillors Sworn in by Judge McLatchey and Committees are Organized
HEAVY SESSION

The first meeting of the new council was held in the council chambers on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding over a full attendance.

After the councillors had been sworn in by His Honor Judge McLatchey, the Town Clerk read the returns of the election constituting the council. The minutes of the previous meeting were then read and confirmed.

On motion the regular order of business was suspended and a committee composed of councillors White, Miller and Alexander was appointed to draft the standing committees for the current year. The committee reported as follows:

By-laws and Legislation: The Mayor chairman, councillors Alexander and Miller.

Finance and Auditing: councillor Miller chairman, the Mayor and councillor Alexander.

Assessment and Appeals: councillor Ellsworth chairman, councillors Quinn and Lunan.

Police and License: councillor Lunan chairman, councillors White and Quinn.

Public Property and Streets: councillor Pinault chairman, councillors Miller and Ellsworth.

Water and Sewerage: councillor Alexander chairman the Mayor and councillor Ferguson.

Electric Light: councillor White, chairman, councillors Lunan and Alexander.

Fire Protection: councillor Ferguson chairman, councillors White and Pinault.

Education and Improvement: the Mayor chairman, councillor Ferguson and Ellsworth.

Public Charities: councillor Quinn chairman, Pinault and Lunan.

The regular order of business was then resumed.

Communication read from Police officer Mann asking for an increase in salary. Letter referred to Police and License committee.

Communication read from S. W. Dimock relative to license fee for moving picture shows. He claimed that the fee asked was too high and looking to the fact that he was a large rate payer in the town he suggested a meeting to come to some mutual arrangement and thought it well to avoid litigation. Councillor Pinault said that the council had passed a resolution fixing the license fee at \$300, and later had changed it to \$200 per annum, and did not see that anything further could be done in the matter and moved that the letter be placed on file. This was seconded by councillor Alexander.

Councillor Miller suggested that the matter be referred to the Police and License committee and get them

CORONER'S JURY HOLD INQUEST ON DEATH OF FIREMAN JAMIESON

Evidence Given Shows That Engine and Track Were in Good Condition.—Verdict of Jury Attaches no Blame to Anyone.

THE DECEASED JAMES JAMIESON

On Monday evening the adjourned inquest into the death of James Jamieson, fireman on the ill-fated Dalhousie branch train which was wrecked last Monday was held before the Coroner Dr. A. Martin, in the Lacasse building the following jury being in attendance, Messrs. H. P. Doyle, F. C. Lutz, W. H. Gray, W. H. Wallace, W. P. Gray, D. R. Keddy and O. Smith, foreman.

Evidence was given by engineer T. G. Scott, conductor Geo. Lamphey, brakeman A. McMillan, passengers W. D. Duncan, W. A. True-man, R. B. Keith, A. LaPlante, and Messrs Stout and Devereaux of the Intercolonial Railway and Dr. H. Lunan.

It was established from the evidence led that the cause of the accident which culminated in the death of fireman Jamieson was neither excessive speed nor poor track.

Conflicting evidence was given as to the speed of the train, which latterly was established at between 15 to 18 miles per hour; not an excessive rate of speed for a train running even tender first.

One point established was that engineers would sooner run ahead than with tender first at all times.

The verdict of the jury was to the effect that the accident was caused by the tender leaving the rails, running some little distance and plunging into the North bank thereby derauling the engine and cars. That fireman Jamieson's death was caused by injuries received from being pinned between the peak of the cab and the ground, and exposure.

No blame for the accident was attributed to any employee, but the jury condemned the practice of running engines tender first on passenger trains and asked those in authority to remedy the evil.

The track was found to be in good order considering the time of year, the rails usually showing slight unevenness but otherwise were in good condition at the point of the run off, not a spike being out of place.

From the evidence of foreman Devereaux it was shown that the engine was making its first run after being in the shops for repairs, these repairs being in no way connected with anything that might cause derauling. As far as he knew, his opinion was that the engine was in good condition, having no wheel trouble of any kind.
