One bashel of bar-fley was worth 80 cents a short time ago. If you wanted to get a barrel of salt and give a bushel and a eighth, or six pounds, to get one barrel of salt. That is if you were get-ting the full value of your swap. In other words, one bushel and six pounds of barley is the real value for one barrel of salt. Take your barley now and try and get a barrel of salt. You will get 45 cents for your barley, and you have to give \$1.50 worth of barley, or 3 bushels and 10 pounds, to get one barrel of salt.
