

will be received ever to-day. The French seem to be doing their utmost to delay its transmission, possibly in the hope of a more active show of resistance by Germany, which will justify France in taking more drastic

Meanwhile British opinion strengthening, and it is generally conceded that delay may open the gate to disaster. Not only Germany, France trade, which is due largely to the catastrophic decline of European curency. English leaders of business are demanding that the British Governent take the lead in a situation which they declare is the most critical that
