The market is beginning to feel the effects of the hot weather in a quieter demand for butcher cattle. Local butchers report a reduction in the general consumption of meat, though not to such an extent as might have been expected. Ordinarily the housekeeper at this season goes in more for fruit and less meat. Owing, however, to the present comparative scarcity and high prices of berries and fruits generally the family butcher is still looked for the staple supplies. While trade in the cattle market bears a hot weather aspect and a little quieter demand generally prices are holding steady at yesterday's quotations.
