There is yet time to prepare the land for fall sown crops such as wheat or rye. The following suggestions are based on crop and soil experiences at the Domin-ion Experimental Farms and Stations in the Eastern provinces. WHEAT.—Sow on land either natural-ly or artificially drained, rich in suitable plant tood, worked into a mellow, mod-erately deep seed-bed and situated in dis-tricts where fall sown crops have proved successful. successful.

Soil and Rotation.—Any good soil, preferably clays and loams, where judic-ious crop methods are observed may be used for fall wheat. Clover sod, pea ground and summer-fallow provide most suitable conditions, but meadow or past-ure land, thoroughly prepared, may be expected to give satisfactory returns. Putting War Cripple Back on the Payroll

Fifty Maimed Soldiers Will Demonstrate Vocational Training At The **Canadian National** 

Much has been heard regarding the plans of the Dominion Government to help war cripples to secure remunerative employment in spite of the most serious-wounds or other injuries. But, though Canada is conceded to be far in advance of all other Allted countries in the work of rainstating her uniqued hereas of reinstating her maimed heroes com-paratively few people have seen actual evidence of the miracles being wrought. for the men by specialized vocational training and physical re-construction. This will be remedied at the Canadian National Exhibition where at least fifty men who have been restored to full use fulnes, will demonstrate how the benefi-ciaries of the Government's rehabilitation programme have been made economically self-supporting. Included will be a number of blind men, who have been re-educated and are back on the civic payroll. The men will demonstrate at least 15 industrial processes, including, typesetting oxy-acetylene welding, jewelry manufacture, lens grinding, ass-aving, etc.

Soil Preparation. —As promptly as poss-ible after the removal of the previous crop, plough from 6 to 7 inches deep or as deep as the productive surface will allow, roll or pack and work thoroughly until the seed-bed is deep. mellow and until the seed-bed is deep, mellow and level not later than the second week in September.

Manure.-Light dressings of short manure stimulate strong growth and act as protection during winter. Knolls, inclin-es and rolling land are especially benees and rolling land are especially bene-fitted. Ordinarily manure should be supplied to some other crop in the rota-tion rather than directly for the wheat. Seed.-Sow large, plump, sound seed of strong vitality and free from weed seeds, Use the fanning mill wisely. Treat the seed wheat for "Stinking Smut". This simple method is effective. Immerse the seed for twenty minutes in a solution, made of one pint formalin to forty-two the seed for twenty minutes in a solution, made of one pint formalin to forty-two gallons water. If you are not clear re-garding this point write the Botanical Division, Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Be sure of the vitality of the seed you sow. This home made test will tell you. Count out a hundred kernels, the run of the grain, sow in some of your own soil in a shallow box placed in a sunny widow and keen a comfortable living widow and keep at a comfortable living room temperature. Keep soil damp but not wet, note the growth for two weeks. If only part of the seeds germinate or if

If only part of the seeds germinate or if the plants grow very slowly, it will be necessary to sow proportionally more seed to the acre. The usual rate of seed-ing is from 1½ to 1½ bushels per acre. Varieties.— Dawsons Golden Chaff, America Banner and American Wonder are high yielding varieties. Where these cannot be obtained secure hardiest fall variety available. For supply of seed note advertisements in farm journals or communicate with the Seed Branch, De-partment of Agriculture, Ottawa.

KYB.-Failtye is hardler than tain wheat and for this reason can be sown profiably later in the season, on a greater evariety of soils and under more severe climatic conditions.
While rye does best, like wheat, on well drained loam or clay-loam soils, it will produce fair yields on lighter sands and loams. On very fertile soils rye is likely to lodge and will produce little grain. Under such for under such for the growing of fall wheat, it would be advisable to sow wheat rather than rye.
Otherwise the method of seed-bed preparation for rye is similar to that outlined for wheat. The rate of seeding is usually from 14 to 2 bushels per acre. The common fall rye is the only variety available which can usually be secured from seed merchants.
