



Sprinkling a few drops of cold water upon the face and cautiously holding spirits of hartshorn under the nose will aid, by reflex action, in restoring the functions of the heart and brain. Cold water should never be poured upon a fainting person, as everything beyond the first shock is depressing and should hence be
