EUROPEAN CROPS.

The weather throughout England is wet and unpropitious and unfavorable for crops. Heavy rains have caused great damage to hay and other crops in the Midlands, Warwickshire and Leicestershire and in other parts of the province. A Dublin despatch to the Daily News says: "Excessive rains have prevailed nearly all the season of 1879-80, and have done much to excite serious apprehensions in regard to the harvest. In many parts of France the harvest has already begun and gives promise of a good crop, but in some districts it is not so good. In the south barley and oats promise well. In the centre winter barley is of good quality, but deficient in quantity. Rye looks well, also wheat, which is an average good crop. The Echo agricole considers that the harvest prospects in the north, with tolerable weather, are eminently promising; good in the central districts; scarcely up to the mark in the west and east, and well up to the average in the southwest and the districts around Paris. The quality in general is decidedly superior to that of the season of 1878-79. There are also good prospects of the crops of potatoes, beets and hops. The hay crop is not successful, but there is every chance of a good crop of clover, lucerne and vineyards do not share the improved aspect, excepting the olive, which promises a good yield. In Holland there is an excellent crop of rye. In Germany rye, clover and potatoes require more sun. The hay crop is very bad, and the only thing that looks well is wheat. Austria yields much from wet weather. In Hungary barley, wheat and rye are very promising. Oats and maize are considerably above average. The Italian harvest is superior both as to quantity and quality. Russia is complaining loudly of deficiency, mainly owing to the presence of various insects."

THE HORSE MARKET.

Although there has been only a small business in horses during the past week, the shipments from this city show quite an increase over those of the week previous, when they were reduced to 23 horses, costing \$2,832, while last week they amounted to 52 horses, costing \$9,127.50. A celebrated racer was shipped from Chicago last Tuesday valued at \$1,500, the property of Messrs. N. Taylor, Beauvois and Bonnet. Two other horses intended to run at the Barrow Races on July 21st, were shipped on the same date by Mr. Dawes, of Leamington. Sales made on this market since our last report averaged from \$50 to \$140 per head, and the price for the last week's shipments, including the racers, was \$177.80. The shippers during the week were—W. H. Campbell, Bradford, Conn.; J. Goshing, Portland, Maine; E. A. McLaughlin, Montreal; J. R. Bourdon, Chicago; Z. King, Saratoga, New York; F. Adams, Boston, Mass.; J. Hicks, Worcester, Mass. The shipments of horses from this city for week ending Saturday last were as follows:—July 13th, one horse, \$140; one do., \$90; 7 do., \$385; 8 do., \$598; one do., \$100; two do., \$240; July 14th, one horse \$100; 11 do., \$972; 7 do., \$831.50; 8 do., \$388.

THE CATTLE MARKET.

There was a good demand for cattle to-day both for local and shipping purposes, but the supply being light, full former rates were obtained, while several shipping lots were held for an advance. We quote good to choice shipping cattle 50 to 60c per lb, live weight, and butchery cattle from 35 to 45c per lb according to quality. Hogs sold at 50 to 75c per 100 lbs. A cable despatch just received from England says: "Trade dull, higher prices impossible; no margin at cost price and expenses." At St. Louis a parcel of cattle were sent to New York by the steamer City of New York, which had been sold to a party in New York at 50c per lb. Rates of ocean freight are quoted at 24 to 25c per head for cattle and 30c for sheep, with 10c per head for sheep. At 24 lbs. At Viger market, where the principal buyers' resort, there were 150 cattle offered for sale, which met with a good demand at prices ranging from 30 to 40c per lb, live weight, according to quality. There was a fair supply of sheep and lambs, numbering about 300, but the demand was quite brisk, and most of the offerings were sold at 30 to 40c per lb, live weight, at \$2.50 each, and sheep at \$3.50 each, and prices to size. Calves are now out of season, and prices for what are brought in are very high.

HEARD OF THE BOGUS AGENTS.

To the Editor of the True Witness. For some time past the reputation of the New York WEBER PIANO has suffered from the attempts of unscrupulous Agents, particularly in the Province of Quebec, to palm off on the public inferior Pianos, under the name of Weber. These instruments are for the most part manufactured in Ontario, or less than two factories being located there; they are sold to dealers at from \$130 to \$150, and advertised by their agents here to retail at \$175 to \$200, affording at this price a large profit, but in country places, where deception is more easily practised, the price obtained is twice these figures. Instead of using their own name and selling to the trade, the object of the manufacturers appears to be to adopt the name of Weber and employ Organ and Sew-Machine Agents travelling the country to act as Agents for their sale, many of which are sold to farmers and country merchants under the pretence of their being the genuine WEBER Piano. Most of the Pianos thus sold come under the designation of Bogus not being Rosewood, but stained to imitate it. Knowing the great expense and high reputation of the genuine New York WEBER, the Wily Agent often obliterates from the key-board the place of manufacture, and by representing himself as WEBER'S Agent deceives the purchaser, and induces him to pay some times as high as \$400 for a Piano which did not cost more than \$150 to \$160. Some of these Agents circulate cards and bills representing themselves as WEBER'S Agents, and more easily to deceive the ignorant. If they find their customers protectionists, they play the N. P. card, say the Ontario WEBER is about as good as the New York Piano, or that WEBER has an interest in the Kingston factory, and manufactures his Pianos there for the Canadian market, thereby saving large duties, &c., &c., and by one or other of these taking art, victimize the poor purchaser and induce him to pay three times the cost of the instrument. This trade, particularly in the Eastern Townships, has been found very profitable, and hence the Bogus Agents appear to be increasing. The following handbill has been sent us from Clarenceville: "Grand Concert for the benefit of St. George's Church, Clarenceville, to be held in the Clarenceville Hall, on Friday evening, June 18, 1880. The following talent will be present: Here follow the names of the performers, which we omit. On the bottom of the bill it reads: "Mr. McIntosh, Agent for the New York Weber, will kindly furnish a piano for the occasion." What Piano was furnished by Mr. McIntosh is not stated, but a N. Y. Weber is plainly inferred. This is enough to show the deliberate fraud, for Mr. McIntosh is not an agent of the New York Weber, but is said to be one of those who do a thriving country trade in a very different Weber, by falsely representing himself to be so. We don't object to the Kingston Pianos being sold at \$150 or \$100 dollars, as the parties may please, but we do decidedly object to the constant attempt, often successful, to pass them off as the greatest piano of the age, for which their objection of Weber's name gives them the tempting opportunity. We caution all parties against patronizing these frauds. If they want a good-moderate-priced Piano, of genuine Rosewood, guaranteed in all respects, they can have one from us at from \$225 to \$250, or if they want the real Weber, which is undoubtedly the finest Piano in the world, they can, at a small advance on the cost, buy it through us or our Agents. Meantime it is as well to know that the cheapest Piano on Weber's list costs just about the price of THREE of these Ontario imitations which has too long been used for purposes of fraud and deception.
