

A WARNING (Against Mixed Marriages).—(Before Sir C. Cresswell and Special Jurors.)—Place v. Place. This was a petition by Mrs. Place for a judicial separation, on the grounds of adultery, cruelty, and desertion. These charges were denied by the respondent, who also pleaded condonation as to the adultery.

Mr. Edwin James, Q.C., and Mr. Hannen, were counsel for the petitioner; Mr. Sergeant Parry and Mr. Thompson for the respondent.

Mr. E. James, in opening the case, stated that Mrs. Place prayed for a judicial separation, instead of a dissolution of marriage, because she was a Roman Catholic. Her maiden name was Byrne, and she was the daughter of R. Catholic parents living at Rosemount, near New Ross, in Ireland; and the respondent, Thomas Place, was the son of a gentleman of property in Wales, and had been in the army. They had frequent quarrels upon the subject of the education of their children, Mrs. Place wishing them to be brought up as Roman Catholics, and Mr. Place, who was a Protestant, insisting that they should be brought up in the Church of which he was a member. The learned counsel detailed various acts of cruelty with which the respondent was charged, and said that he had put on the record a justification of his conduct, on the ground of his religious differences with his wife. The adultery was committed with a servant in his employment.

Mrs. Madeline Place was then examined, and said her family lived at Rosemount, near New Ross, in Wexford. Captain Place was a friend of her brother, and she became acquainted with him in March, 1847, when he was paying a visit in the neighborhood. He proposed to her in August, 1847, and they were married in June, 1848. She was a Roman Catholic, and there was a distinct agreement before the marriage that any children they might have should be educated in the Roman Catholic religion. They lived at Danhill, in Waterford, up to 1852, and then removed to Glen-lodge, near Carrick-on-Shuir, where they remained until May, 1858. There were three children of the marriage—the eldest a boy, born in June 1849; the second, also a boy, born in November, 1850; and the third, a girl, born in February, 1855. After their marriage they lived happily together until 1853. He then forbade her going to chapel any more, and abused her for being a Papist, in the presence of the servant man. He told her not to go to such blackguard and infernal places. In 1855, when his brother visited them, he was much enraged because the servants were not at home, and strapped her down, and after scolding her, struck her head against the wall and broke the canvas partition. His brother spoke to him about his unkindness to her. On several occasions he used violent language about her religion. In 1855 she was reading prayers to the servants, when he said he would have no Catholic humbug going on in his house, and burnt the prayer-book. In 1856 there was a dispute about one of the children being sent to a Protestant clergyman, and she was allowed to take her meals with him. On one occasion he flung her from a chair to the ground and pushed her out of the room. In 1858 he burnt her crucifix. In the same year he struck her on the head with his open hand and kicked her. In May, 1858, she removed from Glen-lodge to lodgings he had taken for her at New Ross, and then went with her children to her mother's house. On the previous Sunday he had abused her, called her a Papist, wished she was dead, and struck her. She had not occupied the same bedroom with him since Feb., 1856, when he burnt the crucifix. She wrote and told her husband that, as she had obtained undeniable evidence of his adultery, she would no longer live with him.

Mr. Sergeant Parry said he did not intend to dispute the adultery.

Sir C. Cresswell asked whether it would be worth while to leave the question of cruelty to the jury as the adultery would entitle the petitioner to a decree.

Mr. Sergeant Parry said that Captain Place was anxious to deny on his oath that he had ever ill-treated or injured his wife. There were many scenes between them, arising from religious differences, but he wished to deny that he had treated her with cruelty.

Sir C. Cresswell said this was not the first time since he had presided in that court that he had observed that some gentlemen appeared to be quite careless as to any imputation on their morality, but to be very sensitive to the charge of cruelty. If the parties desired it, he would leave the question of cruelty to the jury, but, however, it was decided, the decision must give pain to one of them.

It was then arranged that a verdict should be taken for the petitioner upon the issues of adultery and condonation, and that the jury should be discharged upon the other issues.

The verdict was entered accordingly. — *Times*, April 2.
