precipitation was accompanied by increased rates of evaporation due to higher than normal temperatures, thus further aggravating the low level condition.

3. Yes. On March 1, 1964 the water elevation at Kingston was 242.01 feet above mean sea level. On April 1, 1964 the water elevation had increased to 242.58 feet above mean sea level.

4. Based on the March level of the great lakes above lake Ontario and assuming average run-off in the basin of the latter, it is forecast that lake Ontario will achieve a maximum water elevation of approximately 244.50 feet above mean sea level in July 1964.

Question No. 631—Mr. Laprise:

1. How many requests were made, in 1963-64, under the terms of the winter works program by Chapleau county municipalities?

2. How many of these requests were accepted, and what was the amount approved in each case?

Mr. MacEachen: 1. Thirty three applications were received from municipalities in the county of Chapleau under the municipal winter works incentive program 1963-64.

2. Thirty three applications were accepted. The municipalities participating and the estimated federal government share of payroll costs are as follows:

BUTTER OIL SALES

Question No. 639—Mr. Rondeau:

1. To whom has butter oil been sold since 1954?

2. What was the cost price per pound?

3. Has any butter been thrown away, destroyed or rejected in the province of Quebec and the county of Shefford since 1954 and, if so (a) what quantities were involved (b) to whom was the rejected oil sold (c) at what price was it sold?

Mr. Hays: 1. There were no butter oil sales prior to August 1960. From that date to March 31, 1964, butter oil has been sold to the following firms:

Co-operative Agricole de Granby, Granby, P.Q.; Central Creameries, Charlottetown, P.E.I.; Kraft Foods Limited, Town of Mount Royal, P.Q.; Palm Dairies Limited, Edmonton, Alberta; Fraser Valley Milk, Vancouver, B.C.; Shefford Dairy, Lawrenceville, P.Q.; Olive & Dorion Limited, Montreal, P.Q.; Milk Products Limited, Montreal, P.Q.; Dominion Dry Milk, Montreal, P.Q.; R. A. Chisholm Limited, Toronto, Ontario; United Dairy & Poultry, Toronto, Ontario; Birks-Crawford Limited, Vancouver, B.C.; Geo. Hodge & Son Limited, Montreal, P.Q.; Black Diamond Cheese Co., Belleville, Ontario; L. Shapiro, Toronto, Ontario; Lovell & Christmas, Montreal, P.Q.; Weddell Limited, Montreal, P.Q.; Legrade Inc., Montreal, P.Q.; Canada Cold Storage, Montreal, P.Q.; Swift Canadian Company, Toronto, Ontario; Beaver Trading Company, Montreal, P.Q.; Balfour Guthrie, Toronto, Ontario; Eastern Townships Produce, Sherbrooke, P.Q.; Canada Packers Limited, Toronto, Ontario; World Food Program, Rome, Italy; Grace, Kennedy & Company, Montreal, P.Q.

2. The sale price per pound basis Montreal has been: export, 27 cents; domestic up to May 1, 1963, 78½ cents; domestic since May 1, 1963, 65 cents.

3. As of April 1, 1964, there has been no loss of butter or butter oil in the county of Shefford.

3. (a) In the province of Quebec 6,578,942 pounds of butter and butter oil were involved in a fire at St. Denis Sur Richelieu during 1963. (b) Salvageable butter and butter oil were sold to Shefford Dairy, Lawrenceville, and Longueuil Meat Exporting Company, Longueuil. (c) The sale price for salvaged butter was \$17 per box. The sale price for inedible butter oil varied between ½ cent and 5½ cents per pound.

In addition to the loss at St. Denis the board lost, through a fire at Montreal in 1960, 6,608 pounds with no salvage value. An additional 8,064 pounds were salvaged and sold at 44¾ cents to Henri Laurier & Fils of Montreal.
