> I have been advised by the Unemployment laid off will be notified officially as of February 28, which is still a month hence. It is difficult to say just where these people are located. People employed by the Unemployment Insurance Commission who are to be laid off will be given six months' notice, whereas a public servant receives only three months' notice. This is what will happen.

The Unemployment Insurance Commission has decided to issue six months' notice as of February 28, 1969 to all redundant staff who would have been merit listed according to the Public Service Employment Act and were not placed in alternative employment by that date. The hon. member will understand this gives a particular person, or persons, an added opportunity to find work once they are so classified. I, personally, hope that in the six month interval alternate work is obtained for all of the 35. I am sure the employment market during the next six months will be buoyant enough to absorb these people.

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): When a person has been a civil servant for 25 or 30 years, is it any easier to accept unemployment after a six month notice than after a three month notice?
