POSTPONEMENT BY GULF AND CONTINENTAL OF CONSTRUCTION OF FACILITIES IN NEW BRUNSWICK— EFFECT OF LEVY FOR POLLUTION FUND

Mr. J. M. Forrestall (Dartmouth-Halifax East): Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Luck is not with me this week. This is the third time I have risen to ask a question, and now the Prime Minister has left the House.

An hon. Member: Thank God!

Mr. Forrestall: I wanted to direct my question to him, but in his absence I would ask the Acting Prime Minister if he would take note of it and perhaps have the Prime Minister consult with his colleagues. The question concerns the indefinite postponement of the expansion by Conoco of its trans-shipment terminal in New Brunswick and the indication by Mr. McAfee, President of Gulf Oil, Canada, Ltd. that the levy for the creation of a maritimes oil pollution fund seriously jeopardizes any prospects for expansion of oil trans-shipment capabilities in the province of Nova Scotia. This comes immediately on top of the decision of Continental Oil Co. to indefinitely postpone a \$60 million plant in New Brunswick.

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Acting Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, in view of the absence of the leaders of the other parties, the Prime Minister felt it was in order for him to leave but I shall bring this matter to his attention.

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh!

PROGRAM TO ASSIST SMALL FARMERS—AGREEMENT BETWEEN FEDERAL AND PROVINCIAL MINISTERS
