Point of order

Mr. Riis: Mr. Speaker, I regret that the Deputy Prime Minister (Mr. Mazankowski) has indicated that he plans to proceed regardless of the suggestion made by yourself or by others in this House in terms of a more businesslike manner in which to proceed.

I do wish to indicate clearly that I take exception to the position taken by the Hon. Deputy House Leader when he blames this debacle on the Member from Winnipeg. The Government has obviously made a gross error in bungling even the introduction of this major announcement, and it is a major announcement.

If this is the manner in which the Government plans to introduce this major change in government policy, God help us in terms of what that change will actually result in.

Mr. Tobin: Mr. Speaker, I too am disappointed that the Government has decided not to wait until 12 or 12.15 p.m., which would have been in the spirit of reform that we were told was introduced in this place, along with respect for members of all Parties who do not sit on the cabinet benches. I am sure my friend from British Columbia, although he has only recently arrived on the cabinet benches, is outraged, but is compelled by his cabinet solidarity to sit and say nothing.

I am also wondering whether the Government has considered the impact of this statement, in particular on the stock markets. This is a matter which will result in the privatization of a significant portion—

Mr. Speaker: I regret to interrupt the Hon. Member. He may well have a very important point, but it is beyond the point of order we are discussing.

Mr. Gauthier: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a personal point of privilege. I did not want to raise the issue, but since the NDP House Leader raised it, I hope the Government will have the

French copies available to all of us at this time, so that some members of my caucus who cannot work in the English language could follow and possibly read the document as soon as possible. Make it a practice, please.

Mr. Prud'homme: Mr. Speaker, I rise on the same point. I was unaware of that.

I can assure you I was entirely unaware of the fact that no French copy is available for my colleague who wishes to take part in this debate. I think that is really going too far, Mr. Speaker. I know the Deputy Prime Minister of Canada (Mr. Mazankowski). I know he is a reasonable man. I am sure he would agree to postpone his statement until 12.15 p.m. We are not asking for the moon!

May I draw to your attention, Mr. Speaker, that we are now entering what perhaps will be the longest 12 weeks in a row since I have sat in Parliament. There will be no adjournment, nothing.

It is a major announcement. We do not even have the French text. Mr. Speaker, you know that I am always sensitive when we talk about French and English.

It is already 11.45 a.m.. Soon it will be noon, and we might go on talking until 12.15 p.m. Please try and show some cooperation. We aren't asking for the moon.

Mr. Speaker: I am very sorry about this because, as I said before, we have a tradition in this House of co-operation among the Parties and it includes giving the Opposition advance copies of Ministers' statements. Apparently, today
