

of 82 tests were the same. In Toronto, Montreal, St. John and the majority of the other cities and towns the gas was up to the standard for illuminating power.

GERMAN CRUISER TO BE DISARMED

Berlin, in Seaport of Norway, Out of Action During War.

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Nov. 17 .was officially announced here today that the disarmament of the Jerman cruiser, Berlin, which has put in at Trondhjem, a seaport of Norway, nas

The Berlin, with a crew of 450 men arrived at Trondhjem yester hv. Her commander was given the choice of putting to sea within 24 hours or of submitting to disarmament. He chose the latter, apparently preferring to have his ship disarmed rather than risk going out to sea.

Intended to Raid.

The Berlin appeared off Trondhjem, which is on the northwestern coast of Norway and well outside of the North Sea, yesterday. It was then reported that she was endeavoring to escape from the North Sea to act as a commerce raider in the Atlantic, very much as the cruiser Emden did in the Indian Ocean.
