

## NOT MUCH CHANGE IN CATTLE PRICES

Figures for Past Three Days  
Have Varied Very  
Little.

## UNION STOCK YARDS

Thirty-Two Cars Came in  
and Contents  
Sold.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Thursday were 32 cars, 124 cattle, 1580 hogs, 130 sheep and lambs and 23 calves.

The 124 cattle, with a few left over from Wednesday, were bought up at about the same price as prevailed during the past three days. One choice steer, 1250 lbs., sold at \$8.15 per cwt., the prevailing price being from \$6 to \$7 and \$7.50 for steers and heifers, while cows sold from \$6.75 to \$7.25, and bulls from \$5 to \$5.50. Stockers and feeders sold at steady prices.

Milkers and springers, calves, sheep and lambs, as well as hogs, sold at steady to firm prices.

**Butcher's Cattle.** Choice butchers, \$7.50 to \$8.15; good butchers, \$7 to \$7.50; medium at \$6.50 to \$7; cull butchers, \$5.50 to \$6; common at \$5 to \$5.50; and late springers at \$4 to \$5.

## STRONG STATISTICAL POSITION OF WHEAT

American Export Surplus Will Be  
Exhausted Long Before End  
of the Crop Year.

R. W. Snow, the Chicago crop expert, in an account of the extraordinary conditions prevailing, recently decided to depart from the usual practice of waiting until March 1, to gather reports upon the amount of grain remaining in farmers' hands and has compiled a statement through his correspondent showing conditions as they existed on January 15.

This report was last night sent out to his Canadian colleagues by J. G. Beatty of Erickson, Perkins & Company. After explaining that owing to the fact that this is the first year in which the figures have been collected at this time, there is an absence of comparative data for previous years, Mr. Snow says:

"The returns of my local agents with an arbitrary allowance of something above 10 per cent. for possibility of under-estimates on account of the peculiar conditions now existing, show 27.7 per cent. of the wheat crop still on farms on January 15, or a total of 246 million bushels.

"The commercial stocks on January 15 were approximately 110 million bushels, and with this return of farm stocks furnishes a total supply at this date of 356 million bushels.

"Our domestic requirements for consumption January 15 to June 30, 5 months, upon the basis of 5.2 bushels per capita per annum are 235 million bushels, and our spring seedling requirements 40 million, making a total of 275 million bushels. This leaves a total of 81 million bushels available for export to June 30, and for stocks carried over in all positions.

"The smallest carry-over stock reported in recent years was in 1909, when farm stocks of 15 million and commercial stocks of 28 million bushels made a total of 43 million bushels, which has been regarded as close to the possible minimum. If this be regarded as a minimum for stocks on June 30 it follows that we have only 48 million bushels of wheat for export during the next 5 months without trenching upon what is required for domestic consumption.

"A comparison of the rate now going on will exhaust this surplus long before the end of the crop year."

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy is not allowed. The homestead must be made at the Sub-Agency, on certain conditions.

Duration of six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except in certain districts.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$200 per acre.

Duration of six months' residence in each three years after earning homestead patent; also full cultivation. Extra homestead patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fifty acres.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. The stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
