all their fishery will be usurped by the enemy, and the colony itfelf be encroached upon, and infulted, in the fame manner, as was done immediately after the late treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle. Befides, fhould they fortify this island, and they doubtles would, it would in a time of war be a great eve-fore to our harbour of Halifax; and though it has not either port or harbour at prefent, yet its fituation and coaft will admit of its becoming a neft of privateers to the great detriment of our trade. The only way to deal with the French nation is not to permit them to have an inch of ground near any of our North American fettlements. In a word, it is the only way we can act with fafety to ourfelves; and if this was not the fenfe of the ministry when they demolished Louisbourg, what was it demolished for ? Therefore Sable ought by all means to remain in its prefent condition. The French are to enjoy, without this island, a more extensive branch of the fifhery, with its conveniences, than they ought. It was faid when M. Buffy was here, that nothing lefs than all North America, and the whole American fifhery, would fatisfy the people of this nation for the injuries they have received. Have we fince that time changed our inhabitants or our opinions ?- I hope neither.
