MICHAEL FRASER CASE TO BE FOUGHT OUT AGAIN

Such is Substantially Decision of Divisional Court in Historic Legal Battle.

In an endeavor to secure more light, the divisional court decided yesterday to practically throw open the whole case of old Michael Fraser of Midland, whose marriage a year ago last January with Hannah M. O. Robertson, a comparatively young lady, has been contested by the aged bridegroom's relatives. Michael Fraser is eighty years old and is worth about eighty or one hundred thousand dollars. His nearest kin are Catherine McCormick and her brother of Midland. The latter claims that old Michael was of unsound mind and Justice Britton decided against them. The case in the divisional court yesterday was an appeal by Catherine McCormick against this judgment, and at the conclusion of the argument of their counsel, A.E.H. Creswick, K.C., and A. McLean Macdonald, K.C., the court announced that they desired further evidence, and directed that fifteen witnesses be produced on

Friday next, including the old man himself if it is deemed that his health will permit of the journey.

Suffering from senile decay, Dr. Bruce Smith, who testified at the trial in Barrie last fall to the effect that the aged bridegroom was suffering from arterial sclerosis and senile decay, has also been summoned, and so have the present Mrs. Fraser and her ministerial parent, neither of whom gave evidence at the trial.

Dr. W. P. Caven was selected by the court to give his opinion as to the advisability of producing him in court. The court also insists that all correspondence between Mrs. Fraser and her father, who performed the ceremony, be produced relative to the period between August 31, 1909, and January 13, 1910, when the marriage took place. Also Fraser's bank is demanded and all cheques issued by or for him from August 31, 1909, to the present date.

This procedure is the result of an intimation by Counsel Creswick that Fraser had "chequed" out \$5000. "The ammunition with which they have been fighting us," said Mr. Creswick.

CHINAMAN GOES TO TRIAL

Lee Jim's Premises Contained \$1000 Worth of Opium.

Lee Jim, a Chinaman, was committed to trial in police court yesterday morning upon a charge of keeping opium for sale. About \$1000 worth of the drug in its crude form had been seized upon his premises at 187 East Queen-street by Staff Inspector Kennedy and Inspector Cuddy. A charge of keeping a disorderly house was withdrawn.

The staff inspector told that Lee Jim was not anxious to admit him into his home after he had been called, but that he had been persistent, and had found two celestial smokers in addition to discovering the "hop."

A MORE MODERN JAIL

QUELPH, April 5.—(Special.)—The Wellington County Jail is to be torn down and replaced with a smaller, but more modern building, to cost about \$20,000. A sub-committee of the county council, with reference to the establishment of a public bureau here, after the conference he will take a trip around the city. TORONTO TO BE CENTRE OF NEW ONTARIO TRADE

J. L. Englehart to Address Board of Trade—Progress of Campaign.

To-day at 1 o'clock members of the board of trade will assemble for lunch in McConkey's, when J. L. Englehart will deliver an address on Northern Ontario, in connection with a campaign which the board proposes to conduct with a view of centering the trade of that region in Toronto. Direct railway building will be encouraged, reports will be arranged for as to the possibilities and requirements of the district, and excursions will be promoted.

The executive of the board of trade have decided that commercial travellers, providing they bring a voucher for them, are eligible for membership. A matter which will be at once taken up by the board of trade will be sanitation with regard to the public health and the life and condition of children. Hence the executive are anxious to have doctors, dentists and professional university men become members. It is probable that one of the most important committees will be that on sanitation. It is felt that the stronger this committee the greater the influence for public welfare.

Yesterday many applications were received, and it was fair to say that they are now over six hundred members, but captains and committees have but practically two and one-half days to work and consequently if they do not get a big move on there is a possibility that the required number of one thousand may not be obtained.

WILL APPEAL TO COURTS

Sub-Contractors on G.T.P. Object to Reduction of Classification.

WINNIPEG, April 5.—Sub-contractors, who worked on construction of the transcontinental, east of this city, will make a fight to the bitter end in the next few months to secure what they deem to be justice from the Dominion government. The amount of money involved in the case is stated to be \$700,000. The contractors are fighting against a reduction of the classification, which the engineers have asked. The reduction would mean a large loss to the men who did the work, and the courts will be called upon to decide the matter.

BARRISTER GOES TO TRIAL

Gordon Russell, barrister-at-law, appeared in police court yesterday morning, but not in his official capacity. He was charged with forging the name of H. Reid to a note for \$400. He was defended by T. C. Robinson, K.C. When Mr. Reid swore that he had not signed the note, Russell was committed for trial, he having chosen to be tried by a jury.

ROAD TO RUIN

Meroy and charity were meted out in police court yesterday morning to Annie Wilson, a girl of the streets, who was sent to the Mercer for three months in order that she might receive medical attention. The girl was young and pretty, but was arrayed in cheap and tawdry dress.

No definite program was outlined, but it was decided to confer with the military authorities and secure the services of the military bands. The committee was given full power to make arrangements regarding this, and there will be another conference to complete details.

CHILD BURNED TO DEATH MOTHER CAN'T RECOVER

Mistook Can of Gasoline For Coal Oil When Filling an Oil Stove.

CORNWALL, April 5.—(Special.)—Mrs. Alexander Demarsh sustained injuries which will probably result fatally, and her only child, a 2-year-old boy, was burned to death this afternoon, as the result of the mother mistaking a can of gasoline for coal oil. The woman and her child were alone in the house, and it is believed that she made a mistake in the cans when filling a coal oil stove, and that when she attempted to light the stove it exploded.

SMALLPOX AT OTTAWA

In consequence of the outbreak of smallpox at Ottawa, Dr. Bell of the provincial board of health has been sent to the Dominion Capital to direct the medical operations. Twenty-seven cases of smallpox at Ottawa are reported.
