CHURCH UNION AGAIN BEFORE PRESBYTERY

But Definite Action Was Deferred
Until Next Year—Mr. Black's
Resignation Accepted.

A general discussion of the first eight articles of the proposed basis of church union occupied most of the time of the members of the Toronto Presbytery yesterday afternoon. No official action was taken, but a general agreement was reached.

In the committee of the whole, Rev. Dr. Gilroy of College-st. Church, acting as chairman, it was agreed to defer action until every member of the church had voted on the question. The matter will be discussed further at the next meeting of the presbytery in December.

Another meeting will be called in January or February, at which the question will again come up for discussion.

At the morning session, the resignation of Rev. Blaney S. Black of Knox Beach Church, was accepted. The Dufferin-st. congregation was given permission to mortgage their church property for \$15,000. The call of Rev. Malcolm McArthur from St. Andrew's Church, Scarborough, to Knox Church, Kilmarnock, was sustained.

It was agreed to accept Oakwood mission as a Presbyterian mission. Heretofore it has been conducted independently. Dr. Wardlaw Taylor will have charge of the mission.

PLACE WATERWORKS UNDER COMMISSION

Board of Control Decides to Re-
commend That Step to
the Council.

By a close vote, Mayor Geary, Controllers Ward and Church for and Controllers Spence and Hocken against, the board of control yesterday decided to recommend to the city council that the waterworks department be put under the hydro-electric commission. The city council will deal with the matter at the next meeting, Monday.

When the matter was opened Controller Church said he thought the time would come when the department would be placed under the commission but in the meantime it should be made an independent department with a competent man in charge. He was in favor of Mr. Harris.

Controller Ward declared that his sentiments with regard to a public utilities commission had not changed. He moved that the legislature be petitioned to empower the city to erect a commission to take charge of the waterworks, the hydro-electric and the surface and proposed underground railways. It did not carry as it was thought to be a little premature.

Controller Hocken was of the opinion that it would be a mistake to put the department under the commission at present, but he thought in time it would be needed.

STABBED THE BRIDEGROOM.

MONTREAL, Nov. 7.—Maddened at jealousy at the sight of the bridegroom dancing with his bride at the Helanet's wedding at No. 2 Vallant-street last night, E. Taffan is alleged to have driven a "shiv" up to the hip into the arm of his newly wedded host. The wedding festivities were at their height when the happy party was rudely broken up by an assault upon the head of the household, for which Taffan was arrested.

NO PROVINCIAL COMMISSION.

Sir James Whitney gave a positive denial to the statement published yesterday that the provincial government intended to appoint a commission with provincial jurisdiction, to take charge of all the liquor licenses in the province, and to administer the license law.

TO GET EXACT FIGURES

Report Coming on Traffic Tubes
Should Carry.

An estimate will be made as to the probable amount of traffic that will be carried by the tube system when completed. The board of control so instructed the city engineer yesterday. He has been asked to see that a careful calculation be made as to what the business ought to be not only the first year, but in succeeding years. J. I. Cousins, the city railway engineer, will do the work.

The work is going to be done with the object of giving the voters the greatest possible amount of information on the subject so that they will know exactly what they are voting on.

From estimates that have been made it is declared that the tube system will pay its own upkeep as well as the sinking fund from the very start.

T. Eaton Company Extends.

A permit has been granted the T. Eaton Company for a new building at 71, 73 and 81 Teraulay-street to cost \$55,000. The structure will be a four-story brick warehouse.

LET 'EM PROTEST

Provincial Authorities Not Worrying
About Debarment of U. S. Films.

It is of little concern to the provincial authorities whether or not the American film manufacturers are protesting to the United States secretary of state about the censorship of films in Ontario.

Hon. A. J. Matheson stated last night that he did not intend to take any action in the matter, nor indeed had he heard that the manufacturers were making any protest, beyond what he read in the newspapers.

"We are only putting the censorship on objectionable films," he said. "If boat sails past flying the Stars and stripes, there will be no objection. But some of the films have gone so far as to depict battles between British and American soldiers, with the result largely in favor of the latter, and finally resulting in the hauling down of the British flag. Pictures of this kind are regarded as objectionable in Ontario, and hence the censorship."

Sir James Whitney hadn't heard of any action being taken by the provincial government, or indeed that any action would be taken.

"I have no doubt," said the premier, "that these manufacturers would object to their trade being curtailed in Ontario, and it is quite likely that they might endeavor to make protests in order to get sympathy from the United States Government, if possible. But I haven't heard anything definite about the matter."

FORCED OUT OF MINISTRY.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Nov. 7.—Be-
cause of the criticism resulting from his marrying Col. John Jacob Astor and Miss Madeline T. Force at Newport, on Sept. 9, Rev. Joseph Lambert has resigned as pastor of the Elmwood Temple (Congregational), of this city, and will leave the ministry to go into business. Although the church has not as yet accepted his resignation, Mr. Lambert says that he will insist upon it doing so. His retirement will be considered by the church at a meeting on Nov. 16.

NOBEL PRIZE FOR CHEMISTRY

Awarded to Woman Professor in the
University of Paris.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 7.—It is an-
nounced that the Nobel prize for
chemistry has been awarded to Mme.
Marie Sklodowska Curie of the Uni-
versity of Paris.

Mme. Curie is the chief professor of
sciences in the University of Paris.
She was the co-discoverer with her
husband, Prof. Pierre Curie, of radium,
and in 1903 shared with him half of
the Nobel prize for physics, the other
half being awarded to Prof. Antoine
Henri Becquerel. Each of the five
Nobel prizes, awarded annually,
amounts to \$40,000.

Recent announcement was made of
the success of Mme. Curie in produc-
ing polonium, "a new element possess-
ing a radio-activity superior to
radium."

CHARGED WITH MURDER

True Bill Against Roselli—Prisoner
Pleads Not Guilty.

"Not guilty," pleaded Francisco Ro-
selli in the criminal assizes yesterday
in answer to the charge of murdering
Gracchino Cecl on the night of April
24, during a fiasco in an Agnes-street
house.

For some minutes after the true bill
was presented to his lordship, the court
sat in silence, awaiting the prisoner's
counsel, W. A. Henderson, T. G. Ron-
nette, partner of Mr. Henderson, how-
ever, came in, and after a short con-
sultation with Chief Justice Falcon-
bridge, the case was adjourned until
10 o'clock this morning.

A. E. Creswick, K.C., of Barrie, is
conducting the case for the crown.
Roselli has greatly changed since his
arrest. He has lost his fresh color,
and is very nervous.
