YOU BET THEY ARE SLOW.

Hearst Will Not Accept Nomination From Party. New York, Aug. 28.—William Randolph Hearst said to-day in the course of an interview that he would not be a candidate for governor at the next election on the Democratic ticket.

"I shall run only as the nominee of the Independent League," he said. "Of course I should be glad of all the Democratic votes I could get. But I have declared, I am anxious to satisfy the bosses than he is to serve the people. He also said he did not believe Murphy was supporting him, Murphy's object being to affect the primary voting and to confuse men on Hearst's side. "Is there any truth in the report that there is a coolness between you and Mr. Bryan because of the fact that you may be a presidential candidate in 1908?" he was asked. "Not the slightest truth," he said.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

FEEL SURE OF SETTLEMENT IN CATARACT MORE DURABLE

General Satisfaction That President Mahon Counseled Peace at Midnight Meeting.

Hamilton, Aug. 28.—(Special)—There is general satisfaction among the public at large, and especially the merchants and manufacturers, to-day at the outcome of the negotiations between the Cataract Power Co. and the electric railway employees.

Since the conference between representatives of the union and General Manager Hawkins at his house last night, at which an understanding was reached, that the company would agree to a settlement from each of the roads, with the president of the union, the men sent a protest to the company. The company manager Green stated to-day that he had received the agreement, but it had not been considered by the company. The return of Manager Hawkins, who is in Toronto, however, Mr. Green felt confident that a settlement would be arrived at. He refused, however, to discuss the possibility of an increase in wages, and a rearrangement of hours.

One executive and resident Mahon and Magnus Sinclair, the Canadian representative, have the matter in hand now, and expect a reply from the company shortly.

Credit to Mahon. Much credit is given to President Mahon of Detroit for withholding the men from striking last night. When the meeting was called, more than half of those present were ready to vote for a strike without any negotiation whatever, but after Mr. Mahon, in an eloquent address, counseled delay, and urged the men to take time and consider the company's offer, the men voted almost wholly in favor of delay.

Mayor Biggar's Denial. The statements in The World yesterday morning to the effect that Mayor Biggar had publicly disavowed by what has been considered premature action in communicating with the militia officers with a view to having troops called out in case of trouble, has had the effect of causing the mayor to make a short denial to the statements to the press to-day. He said:

"Several of my friends have spoken to me about them, and have asked me why I do not deny them. I wish you would say that I do deny them. They are without foundation. I have not requisitioned the militia, and do not propose to do so unless the occasion demands it."

It will be seen by this that the mayor denies that he requisitioned the militia, whereas The World accused him of communicating with the militia officers with a view to having troops called out in case of trouble. Nothing was said about requisitioning the militia.

Solicitor's Body Home. The remains of City Solicitor MacKellan were brought from Minneapolis, Minn., this morning, and will be interred at 4 o'clock. The city council will hold a special meeting on Thursday afternoon, and will attend the funeral in a body.

A deputation of the Garment Workers' Union will arrive in the city tomorrow and will be entertained by the aldermen on the mountain.

LOCAL FRUIT MARKET. Late Arrival of Consignments is a Complaint That is Made.

Tuesday's market was fairly heavy, but prices showed a firm tone, generally speaking, and Monday's quotations suffered little if any decline. One feature of the wholesale market which serves to restrict trade somewhat is the late hour in the day at which the fruit train arrives. Instead of coming in the morning at 11 or shortly after, allowing plenty of time for the dispatch of the fruit, it is usually a clock before the last of the consignments are unloaded.

Some very fair shipments of grapes were sold on the market yesterday, but much of the offerings were of the ordinary class with the inferior selling at 25c to 30c a basket. Champions brought from 17c to 20c a basket, Moore's Early from 20c to 25c a basket and Niagara from 25c to 30c a basket. The Niagara district crop is most optimistic concerning this crop. Tomatoes are unchanged at from 10c to 12c a basket.

Mr. Belknap sold an especially fine consignment of corn berries at 25c. Very low St. John peaches sold all the way from 50c to 75c a bush, with the other varieties going at from 25c to 30c. WHY THE ICE DIDN'T COME.

It Was Delayed at King City owing to Railway Wreck. One-third of the daily supply of ice for city consumers wasn't delivered yesterday, and one-third (or thereabouts) of the aforesaid consumers wanted to know why. Their ice was not as pronounced as it would have been a week ago, but there is still a torridity in the air that made the absence of the frapped chunks of water from Lake Simcoe seriously felt.

It was all due to the railway accident at King station (on the Northern division of the G. T. R. between the city and Aurora), in which two freight trains were concerned. There were seven cars of ice, three each for the Knickerbocker and Belle Ewart Co., and one for the Lake Simcoe Ice Co. Although the owners were in telegraphic and telephonic communication with the railway authorities all day, nothing was learned as to when the ice could be expected to arrive.

It requires about 20 carloads of ice a day to supply the demand. The "reserve" supply, stored in the city houses, was almost exhausted during the recent hot spell.

A freight train, south bound, running at 30 miles an hour, hit an open switch and crashed into a standing train of cars near King station early yesterday. The engine and fireman jumped and the locomotive was derailed and almost buried in a bog along side the track. Five cars were overturned, three of them bottom up.
