The night girls go to work at 10 oclock at night girls go to work at 10 oclock at night and work thru until 7 o'clock the next morning.

Six Hours in Buffalo.

At Buffalo there are two telephone companies, the Bell and an Independent Company. The working conditions of girl operators employed by both companies are about allke. The working hours vary from six to ten a day. In the outlying exchanges girls go on duty at 7 a.m. and work thru to 6 p.m., with one hour rest for lunch. In the downtown exchange, where business is heavy, the girls work about six hours a day in the Bell exchange. One relay begins at 9,30 a.m. and works until 12.30 p.m. That relay goes off duty then and p.m. That relay goes off duty then and returns at 2.30 and works until 5.30. At that time students and inexperi-enced operators are put on, most of whom work until 10.30 p.m., when the whom work until 10.30 p.m., when the night force comes on and works thru until 7 a.m. Beginners are paid about \$3 a week. The salaries go as high as \$6 and \$8 for experienced operators. 
