GRAIN EXCHANGE LEAVES THE CONVENTION ROOM

Refuse to Have Bylaws Revised by Government—Many Delegates Attend Meeting.

WINNIPEG, June 5.—(Special.)—The convention of the grain growers and the grain exchange commenced this morning in the legislative room at the parliament buildings. About 130 delegates were present representing the Grain Growers' Association, Grain Exchange, track buyers, commission men, bankers and railways. Much time was taken up in a resolution asking that the public be admitted upon the floor and have the privilege of the Grain Exchange.

Premier Roblin opened the convention, which promises to result in an exhaustive decision of the needs of the western grain growers' interests. The feature of the afternoon session was the animated debate between the grain growers' delegates and the Grain Exchange members, resulting, finally, in the withdrawal of the exchange from the convention.

They objected to having their bylaws revised by the government in council. The proceedings were most spirited, the grain growers taking the position that they were forced to grow the grain while the exchange reaped the profit.

MANY GALICIANS ARRIVE.
Largest Number to Come West at One Time.

WINNIPEG, June 5.—(Special.)—The largest number of Galicians to come westward Canada at any one time arrived on two special immigration trains this afternoon. The first train arrived at 11 o'clock, and the second half an hour later. There were 1340 Galicians and 170 other nationalities. These latter, however, were hardly observed among the mob of Galicians, who were dressed in their sheepskin coats, with their bags strapped over their backs.

Most of the men were accompanied by their wives and children. To-night 140 British and 30 French arrived.

CANADA'S BUSINESS WEAPONS.
They Have Helped to Produce a Finer Quality of Goods.

In the battles of business the tariff is the modern wall of defence and the weapon of offence. Germany has been as hostile to Canada as the United States, and against Germany, Canada has imposed a surtax or extra high tariff. This is where it is a weapon of offence.
