## WHO CAN BLAME HIM?

Ottawa, Aug. 21.—Constable Flynn of the

Ottawa police force shot Joseph Lough at

the corner of Murray and Erie-streets late

last night.

A gang of men was at the corner, and

Flynn ordered them to move on. One

of them refused and attacked the constable.

Flynn used his club and was attacked from

behind.

Then Lough sent a forceful blow at the

policeman, and Flynn shot him dead.

Lough then made for the officer, and the

gang backed him. The policeman put

three bullets into Lough, and the gang

scattered.

The wounded man was taken to the

station, and afterwards sent to the Pro-

testant Hospital under guard. The wounds

are in his legs, and are not dangerous.

Flynn has been suspended pending investi-

gation.
