FIRST IN 62 YEARS.

True Bill for Treason Returned Against Col. Lynch.

London, Dec. 19.—The Grand Jury summoned to consider the indictment of Colonel Arthur Lynch, member of parliament for Galway, who was arrested June 11 on landing in England from the continent on the charge of high treason in connection with the part he took in the South African war, where he is alleged to have commanded the Irish brigade, returned a true bill today against the defendant.

The Lord Chief Justice, Baron Alverstone, in charging the jury remarked that it was 62 years since a Grand Jury had to deal with such a charge, which was the highest crime known in law. Col. Lynch's trial at the bar is expected to begin Jan. 20.

Greater Thrill Than Has Been.

London, Dec. 19.—F. J. Melville, in a lecture here yesterday on "The Postage Stamp with Stories," said that at Christmas in 1898 the Canadian Postoffice Department at Ottawa issued a stamp of rather large dimensions and which provided an unusually broad surface of gum. Teetotalers, he added, after using it for some time, came to the conclusion that it was a device of the government, in league with the publicans, and that the stamp was issued expressly to promote a thirst.

Rhodes Scholarships.

Sackville, N.B., Dec. 19.—Dr. Parkin speaking of the Rhodes scholarships, says that those trying for the prizes must be students of at least two years' standing in one of the universities. The scholarships should be awarded not by population, but by provinces, which will mean that each province will have a scholarship of its own.

PARDON FOR 58 STUDENTS.

Czar Grants Amnesty to Those Banished for Rioting.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 19.—The Czar has granted amnesty to the students who were banished for rioting on his name day. He telegraphed to the Minister of the Interior as follows:

"Let the students who were banished for creating disturbances return from Siberia, although they should not for the present be allowed to live in towns where there are high schools. Care must nevertheless be taken that the young men on their return be entrusted to the keeping of their families, as such surroundings will familiarize them with order."

The telegram, which is equivalent to an imperial decree, pardons fifty-eight students exiled to Siberia, in addition to the sixty-two students previously pardoned.

Dominion Line Mediterranean Service.

The Dominion Line has put on its Mediterranean service, in addition to the Vancouver and Cambrian, the two magnificent steamers Commonwealth and England. These steamers sail regularly between Boston and the points mentioned. Two departures for account station for January sailings have been so great that there is a waiting list of passengers. "Halves" It Is.

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—The Railway Committee of the Privy Council held today that a subway is needed where the Grand Trunk tracks cross the Stortington road at Kingston Junction. The railway will pay for the bridge portion, while Kingston City and Frontenac County divide between them the expenses of the approaches.
