
Serious Loss to the Institute; Why Mr. Ferguson Is Leaving It

Told Friends That He Would Not! Remain After Unjust Action of School Board.

The London Collegiate Institute has been dealt another hard blow by the resignation of Mr. W. C. Ferguson, B. A., English master, formerly teacher of modern languages.

Mr. Ferguson is a London boy and is admittedly one of the best teachers in Ontario. He has been virtually driven from his native city by the MacRobert clique of the school board. Mr. Ferguson entered the teaching profession eighteen years ago, was appointed on the staff of the London Collegiate Institute in January, 1892. or eight years before the present principal. He had the third highest salary in the i titute-\$1,500 -but will begin in Riverdale School, Toronto, at \$1,400. Had Mr. R. A. Little been appointed principal of the L. C. A Good Year For Railways

New York, Aug. 28 .- The gross earnings of the railroads of the United States during 1906, according to the fortieth annual number of Poor's Manual, just issued, made the enormous increase over 1905 of \$234,442,516. The net earnings increased \$104,728,224.

This was done in spite of a heavy increase in operating expenses, due to higher wages and increased cost of material. Over 71,000,000 more traveled by rail in 1906 than in the preceding year, while the railroads moved 1.610.099.829 tons as compared with 1,435,312,748 tons in the preceding year.

The total assets of all rail roads are reported as \$17.534 -381.633, or more than six times the total money in circulation in the country.

BRITISH HOUSE PROROGUED TODAY

Long and Arduous Session Ended With the Usual Ceremonies.

old-time ceremonial, the British Parliament was prorogued today, thus ending one of the longest and most arduous sessions, during which the royal assent was given to over 60 bills which the two houses passed.

The members of the House of Commons assembled at noon, and shortly afterwards they were summoned to the House of Lords, where the King's speech was read. The statements made were of the usual colorless character referring to the recent royal visits and the friendly relations existing between Great Britain and the other powers.
