MEDICAL SERVICE MADE FINE RECORD IN RECENT RETREAT

All Wounded Were Safely Removed From Enemy's Clutches.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, May 31.—A British medical mission, representing the British Medical Society, arrived here today to attend the American Congress of Medical Societies, to be held in Chicago June 10. The members include Sir James MacKenzie, Sir Arthur Lane and Col. Herbert A. Bruce, consulting surgeon of the British army in France.

Col. Bruce, who was formerly at the University of Toronto, completed a visit to the advanced hospitals at the front before coming here. During the recent retirement, though tremendous difficulties were imposed on the medical service, the wounded were all safely removed to hospitals in the rear, and none was allowed to fall into the hands of the enemy. The nursing and medical personnel also escaped, though unfortunately suffering some casualties. Tound," Col. Bruce said, "everywhere among the British officers and men at the front a spirit of quiet condence in being able to withstand any attack of the enemy and a stern determination to hold the line at all costs intil the arrival of sufficiently large reinforcements from America to insure complete and final victory."
