McLEOD WILL REFEREE

Hamilton Official to Handle Important Struggle at Central "Y."

Secretary Smith, of the O. A. B. A., has notified Physical Director Taylor, of the Y. M. C. A., that the "Y" juniors, who so decisively defeated the St. Catharines junior basketball five in Brantford, Tuesday night, will play off with Kingston for the championship in Toronto, tomorrow afternoon.

Mr. Smith also notified Mr. Taylor last night that McLeod of Hamilton, who handled the game in Brantford, would again officiate in the Toronto struggle, which will be staged at the Central "Y" at 4:30 o'clock.

"If the boys play the same kind of game that they did at Brantford there will be nothing to it but a championship for London," stated Mr. Taylor last night. "It was one of the best games that I have ever seen, and from start to finish. We ought to win. We expect to win, but the boys realize that the team that beat Toronto by 14 points is one that is not to be despised."

Saturday's game will be the last junior match that James, Lightfoot and McGee will participate in. They will be too old for the juniors next year.

However, Cline, Gillies and Macera will form the nucleus for another fast five, and with the material uncovered in the High School League this season, Manager Taylor will not have to worry over next year's game.

In the six years that the O. A. B. A. has been in operation the London juniors have been in the final four times.

Stephen, Tried Out at Western Fair, Looks Like Class for Shortship Circuit.

Uri Pierce, the Caradoc trainer and developer of a score of fast horses, left last evening for Forest, where he will train his string for the balance of the spring.

He took six horses with him: Stephen, a Belaire, trotter that looks like ready money; Oriole B, by Manrico, a two-year-old with plenty of speed; Tonoko, 2:10, a pacer, and three Uncle colts out of Harriet Gratton and owned by J. K. Darch. Kayo and Mayo, two of this trio, are speedy, and are showing signs of being regular race horses.

Stephen, a pacer, and three Uncle colts for the trotting stakes in the shortship circuit. This horse was turned around last fall at the Western Fair and won a mixed field of trotters and pacers without showing how fast he could go.

With luck he will be better than a 2:10 trotter this summer. Tonoko, campaigned by Bill Collins, is in better shape than for two years, and should take down a lot of money.

Oriole is a two-year-old that has been an eighth of a mile in 16 seconds. She is as pretty as a picture, and, with care, should be a speedy mare. Mr. Pierce will get the horses ready in Forest and will hit Michigan in June.
