STEEL MEN ARE

Vice, labor department, was the first witness called when the special committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment of the provincial governments, federal department of labor, and the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment. The cost to the Federal Government to date for administration from Ottawa amounted to \$60,000. In addition to this, the provinces would expend \$300,000 this year, of which 50 per cent would be refunded by the Dominion. The total estimated expenditure for the department of labor to the end of the fiscal year was \$300,000.

From March 1 to September 6, 152,886 men were placed in regular employment. These were both soldiers and civilians, and more than 65,000 were returned men. Mr. Stewart explained the workings of the "clearing house" system in each province, whereby labor was transferred as needed, by means of apecial transportation rates. There were also inter-provincial clearing houses which equalized employment conditions in the different provinces. The labor department bore the cost of the latter system.

Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees Meets in Convention.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—Two hundred delegates of the Canadian Brotherhood of Raiiroad Employes, representing divisions from Halifax to Vancouver, opened a five-day convention here this morning.

President A. R. Mosher in his opening address this afternoon advised the brotherhood to discountenance the One Big Union movement and urged the appointment of legislative committees to watch federal and provincial legislation affecting the interests of the railroad men. Another recommendation made by the grand president is that the color line in the organization be abolished, admitting to membership on the same basis both white and colored railroad employes. Delegates of the Order of Sleeping Car Porters, now a subsidiary organization, were seated this morning as fraternal delegates.

The question of sympathetic strikes is one of the subjects of general interest to be debated by the convention. The delegates will be walcomed to Ottawa by Mayor Fisher tonight.

London Faces Strict Food Ration Order

LONDON, Sept. 29.—London today faced stricter food rationing than for a year. Regulations, breaches of which were winked at even before the armistice, when supplies started coming in in large quantities, today were clamped down hard on all kinds of meats and butter and sugar. Cured meats, which were only slightly rationed during the war, today were placed in the same category as other meats. Fish was not placed upon the rationing edict, but the lack of transportation is affecting the supply.
