

TWO-YEAR-OLDS AT KENTUCKY OPENING UPSET HEAT RECORDS

Do Four Heats in World's Record Time—M. Dudley Drops Dead in Third.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 29.—The opening day of the meeting of the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association furnished as the feature the two-year-old division of the future, in which Natalie the Great was first choice. In the first heat the favorite went away in the lead, and won with M. Dudley forcing her to the limit. In the second heat the black gelding went to a break he came on to win by a length. In the third mile the field was well bunched with Natalie the Great leading on the far turn, where Mr. Dudley choked down and falling into the fence, was killed by a sharp point of a plank, the best going to Day Star, which had gained on the leaders in the stretch. Day Star won the fourth heat somewhat easily, and the original favorite second. The time of the four heats constitutes a world's record for trotters of that age.

EXPECTS GREAT DEAL OF UNEMPLOYMENT DURING THE WINTER

Labor Department Official Expresses This Opinion.

FORECAST DIFFICULT

But More Serious Situation Than Since War Began Is Expected.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—Bryce M. Stewart, director of employment service, labor department, was the first witness called when the special committee on soldiers' civil re-employment met this morning. He said one or more representatives of the D. S. C. R. was in each of the 90 employment offices in Canada to meet the needs of returned soldiers. These offices were maintained by the co-operation of the provincial governments, federal department of labor, and the department of soldiers' civil re-employment. The cost to the Federal Government to date for administration from Ottawa amounted to \$26,000. In addition to this, the provinces would expend \$300,000 this year, of which 50 per cent would be refunded by the Dominion. The total estimated expenditure for the department of labor to the end of the fiscal year was \$300,000.

From March 1 to September 6, 152,888 men were placed in regular employment. These were both soldiers and civilians, and more than \$5,000 were returned men. Mr. Stewart explained the workings of the "clearing house" system in each province, whereby labor was transferred from one province to another by means of special transportation rates. There were also inter-provincial clearing houses which specialized in different conditions in the different provinces. The labor department bore the cost of the latter system.

Unions Co-operating. The labor unions were co-operating with government officers, said Mr. Stewart. Where men were needed and not available the secretaries of the various unions had always shown themselves ready to assist.

In the Maritime Provinces, where the superintendents of offices were all federal employees, all were returned soldiers. Mr. Stewart said it was hard to estimate the winter's unemployment outlook. He feared the unemployment this winter would be more serious than at any time since the war began.

The labor department was now working on a plan to find out what work was likely to be closed down in the winter. There was little worry about skilled labor, but the unskilled workers must be provided for some 30,000 people in Canada were now unemployed, and most of these were in the cities. The main labor problem was one in itself. Many farmers did not want their men to stay after threshing was over, particularly in the western provinces.

Mr. Morphy asked if it was not costing about \$3 per man for placements. "About \$2.50," Mr. Stewart replied, adding that this figure covered a period of unusual conditions.

Retraining and employment of former members of the Canadian forces were the problems before the committee. The committee held three sessions on the employment question held attention most of the day.

Private employment bureaus and other organizations which divert a certain amount of labor from the existing government bureaus made conditions much harder to handle, Bryce M. Stewart of the employment branch of the federal department of labor, stated. He outlined the conditions in the various provinces and said that on the whole the prospects for this winter in regard to employment were such that in a normal year they would not cause any anxiety.

There was, however, an apparent uneasiness in every mind and this would cause people to feel somewhat more anxious than usual.

The committee was also told that there were over 30,000 returned soldiers in the Dominion who were at present unemployed. These figures were supplied by Major J. L. Anthes, director of the information and service branch, D. S. C. R.

Mr. Anthes gave the figures by provinces as follows: Ontario, 12,090; Manitoba, 4,151; Nova Scotia, 4,021; British Columbia, 3,244; New Brunswick, 1,500; Saskatchewan, 568; Alberta, 450; Prince Edward Island, 860.

Mr. F. G. Robinson, deputy minister of the department of soldiers' civil re-employment, said that within the training facilities many of the disabled veterans would have been thrown on charity. More than 89,000 were given placements by the information and service branch and almost 376,000 men were given information since the armistice.

URGES RAILROADERS TO DISCOUNTANCE O. B. U. MOVEMENT

London Faces Strict Food Ration Order

LONDON, Sept. 29.—London today faced stricter food rationing than for years. Regulations, breaches of which were whittled at even before the armistice, when supplies started coming in large quantities, today were clamped down hard on all kinds of meat and butter and sugar. Cured meats, which were only slightly rationed during the war, today were placed in the same category as other meats. Fish was not placed upon the rationing edict, but the lack of transportation is affecting the supply.

It is roughly estimated that there is a fourteen weeks' food supply in the country, if it is conserved. Restaurants have eliminated butter from their menus, and restricted bread to one roll per meal.

Forest Fires Melt Railway Tracks on the Pacific Coast

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 29.—Forest fires along the line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway above Squamish were so intense during the week-end that steel rails were twisted and melted, a wooden railway bridge was destroyed and giant rocks crumbled and crashed down upon the right-of-way. Great trees fell everywhere and a train with 45 passengers was held up for two days by the fire, which swept through the Cheakamus Valley, driven by a heavy wind.

On Sunday afternoon, the passengers crossed the river on a temporary footbridge at the bottom of the canyon, while the fire raged in the mountains high above them. A freight train then took them to Squamish.

NOTIFY FIRM WITH \$20,000 FACTORY TO VACATE PROPERTY

Windsor Council To Tell Industry Building Factory To Move.

WINDSOR, Sept. 29.—Notice to vacate city property will be served on the Lamb Railway Service Corporation which was recently refused a bonus, including the purchase of land in the municipal factory district, by a vote of ratepayers.

The corporation, believing a favorable vote would be polled, commenced erection of a factory. In reply to a question by one of the aldermen tonight, Mayor Winter said the city could not sell property to the corporation without the consent of the ratepayers. The factory building which is nearing completion, cost more than \$20,000. The head office of the Lamb corporation is at Toronto.

WHISKEY SPOTTERS MUST NOT GO TOO FAR, STATES COURT

Brantford Magistrate Says Should Not Have Prosecuted Mrs. A. Walker.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 29.—Mrs. Alex Walker, Henrietta street, was discharged from custody this morning after evidence against her on the charge of a breach of the O. T. A. had been heard. The magistrate declared that her evidence might be just as reliable as that of two whiskey spotters, Cutts and Simons, who claimed to have made the purchase of a bottle of alcohol from the defendant.

He further declared that the job of whiskey spotter was a mean one, but it had its limitations. A spotter might tell all kinds of lies to secure the liquor, but when it came to promising immunity if the law were broken he was going too far.

Had Been Convicted. He reminded the counsel for the prosecution that Cutts himself had been convicted of a breach of the act in the local police court, and Simons in another case had told a false story which on investigation was proven to have little corroboration. He thought that where immunity had been promised the department should not have prosecuted, and dismissed the case.

HITCH IN ANNEX PLAN. Residents of Parkdale will not immediately annexed to the city, as they hoped. At a hearing before J. A. Ellis of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, held here today, the commissioner ruled that the petitions had not been properly made out. He will ask the board to determine whether new petitions should be circulated or whether a vote of the ratepayers should be ordered over the vote of a majority of those ratepayers at a public meeting, when they protested against any formal vote being taken as unnecessary.
