SENATOR BRYAN DEAD.

Youngest Member of U.S. Upper House Passes Away.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—United States Senator Wm. James Bryan of Florida died at the Providence Hospital early to-day from typhoid fever. It was only seventy days since he took his seat as the successor of the late Senator Stephen R. Mallory, who died Dec. 23, and thirty-three days of that time was spent in his fight against the disease.

Several times during Mr. Bryan's illness his friends despaired of his recovery, but last night it was reported that his condition had taken a turn for the better, and his death to-day, therefore, came as a surprise and a distinct shock.

He came to Washington early in January from Florida and from the day of his arrival was far from well. Finally he was compelled to give up and was taken to the Providence Hospital.

In Mr. Bryan the senate loses the seventh member by death since the adjournment of the 59th congress on March 4, a year ago. They were the two late senators from Alabama, Mr. Morgan and Mr. Pettus, Mr. Mallory of Florida, Mr. Latham of South Carolina, Mr. Proctor of Vermont, Mr. Whyte of Maryland, and Mr. Bryan. Curiously, the last two were the oldest and the youngest members of the senate.

Mr. Whyte was 84 years old, and Mr. Bryan less than 32.

ITALIAN, STABBED, DEAD ASSAILANTS UNDER ARREST

Charge of Murder or Manslaughter—Cataract Power Company Makes an Offer.

HAMILTON, March 22.—(Special.)—Giuseppe Greco, wanted on the charge of stabbing Antonio Rleszo, who died on Saturday, was captured this morning about 2 o'clock with his brother Bruno at Blue Lake, about four miles from Paris. The arrests were made quietly by Chief Twiss of Dundas and Constable Robson, who set out Saturday afternoon, and drove as far west as Brantford. On their way back from Brantford they called at an old shanty about four miles east of Paris that has been fitted up as a sort of hotel for Italians. In response to the summons of the officers the five inhabitants of the place turned out of their bunks and the Greco brothers submitted to arrest without resistance. They were brought to No. three police station this afternoon.

Giuseppe, who is charged with stabbing a seaman about 20 years of age, and small. The charge in the summons is "stabbing and wounding, but this will be amended to something more serious, either murder or manslaughter. His brother, Bruno, who is a big fellow, 26 years of age, is now charged with assisting Giuseppe. The charge against him will likely be amended to aiding and abetting the stabbing.

DECREASE OPIUM IMPORTS.

China Has Decided to Try the Experiment.

PEKIN, March 22.—The throne has given its sanction to an experimental decrease in the importation of opium. The emperor has agreed to try Great Britain. The experiment will extend over three years, and its purpose is to determine the effect this will have on domestic cultivation and the use of opium. If it proves successful, measures will be taken to continue the reduction.

The board of revenue has been ordered to devise a means to replace the resulting deficit in the opium revenue, so that depending loans may be safeguarded.

The throne orders further regulation of the opium evil, and appeals to the nation at large to abandon its use entirely.

COUPLE FATALLY HURT.
WESTBOURNE, Man., March 22.—Mrs. William Morrison was killed instantly and her husband fatally injured while out driving this afternoon. The horse swerved to one side and slipped on the bridge crossing the Mud River, the animal crashing thru the railing and dragging the sleigh and its occupants.

Mrs. Morrison was 73 years of age, and mother-in-law of Edward Lynch, M.L.A. for Westbourne.

TOBACCO WAR HAS HORROR FARMERS IN FEAR LEAVE STATE

Huge Signs Notify "Night Riders" That No Crops Will Be Raised.

LEXINGTON, Ky., March 22.—Because of warning letters and visits from night riders, many farmers in the nearly all of the 62 counties in the white Burley tobacco beds, and at the present time fewer than one-third of the normal number have been started. In many counties huge signs have been erected on buildings and in high places nearby declaring the intention of the farmers not to raise a crop this season. Realizing the difficulty of making a living for their families in the case the decision to raise no tobacco is adhered to, many tenant farmers are preparing to move to other states, by Bruno with a club.
