SCOTT ACT DETECTIVES SEIZE TRUCK LOAD OF ALE

Liquor Was Consigned to Druggists at Fredericton, But is Now in the Police Station.

FREDERICTON, N.B., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—A large seizure of liquor took place here to-day, when several cases of ale, shipped from Montreal to local firms, were confiscated by the police and Scott Act detectives. The liquor was the property of druggists. The beer was taken to the police station on a truck wagon.

It is not known who will be proceeded against, but it is said it may be the C.P.R. boats and trains are watched each day, and have been in some times, so that a line has been kept on shipments, and more seizures are likely to take place in the future.

EVIDENCE CONDUCTED

WITNESS DISCREDITED

"Case a Tissue of Lies," Said Justice Latchford—Mrs. Cohen is Given Judgment in Full.

After a sensational trial in the non-jury assize court Mrs. Cohen has emerged victorious in her action to recover \$500 from the Crown Bank, the Imperial Bank and Adolph Mayer, and has been given judgment to recover that sum with interest added, together with the costs of the court.

The evidence throughout was of the most contradictory character, one witness pledging his word against another's. In addressing Justice Clute at the close of the evidence Mrs. Arnold said the judge had a sharp tilt in connection with his belief in the accuracy of his witnesses. Justice Clute said: "I don't believe she did it. She is a woman who can neither read nor write, and the name must have been put on by some other person with no authority from her."

"The defence has endeavored to show that the money obtained from the Crown Bank was back in her hands before her husband left. Well on Sunday, Feb. 23, a man named Sam Mayers was married to Mrs. Cohen. On Feb. 27 it is said that the man named Smith swore that he, when in the house, saw \$75 counted out when she was leaving. I do not believe it, and I reject the evidence."

"What I think is, that A. Mayer got the cheque at that time with the name B. Cohen on the back of it. He sent Mayer to the Crown Bank with it, but the manager refused to accept it until the boy Mayer or Margolis had signed his name beneath that of Cohen. He signed, and took the money and as he says afterwards paid it over to A. Mayer. After this they try to produce evidence to show that the money went back to Mrs. Cohen. I reject that evidence."

"It is unfortunate that the banks, Crown and Imperial, have got themselves into difficulties in connection with the case, because of the cheque not being properly endorsed, but they have a remedy."

"At the conclusion of the evidence Louis Heyl, K.C., had mentioned to his lordship that in his opinion the case hinged on whether Mrs. Cohen had signed the cheque or authorized anyone else to do so.

In his summing up, Frank Arnold, K.C., said that Norman Helpert was the "prop" of the whole Cohen case, and that he would not hesitate to say, as it was the theory of the defence, that it was he who had put the B. Cohen on the back of the cheque in question.

"Mr. Arnold," said Justice Clute, "you have brought forward one little bit of evidence to prove what you say, and you have no right to make a statement which has no foundation on fact. You said you would bring expert evidence to prove that statement when you made it before, but you haven't done so."

"Well," said Mr. Arnold, "I still think so. I think the handwriting very much alike."

"Well, I don't," answered the judge. Mr. Arnold later apologized for anything he may have said during the course of the trial, and hoped his lordship would be satisfied.

lordship bore no malice, and the justice smilingly accepted the amendment. "We have been at war all thru the case," said the counsel.

Rabbi Helpert of the Chestnut-street Synagogue was called yesterday morning. He married Mrs. Cohen to Mayer.

"What is the name of the man?" asked Justice Clute. "Israel, son of Judah, a Cohen."

"But the name on the license was Mayers, otherwise Margolis?" commented the bench.

"Many people change their names," said the rabbi with a shrug. "You say you marry them knowing the man was using his wrong name?" The witness nodded.

"I think it is very wrong," said the judge. "I think the whole thing was a put up job."

"I hope you don't think I put it up," said Mr. Arnold. "I do think the rabbi is part of it, and I think further that the attorney-general's department should investigate fully," commented the bench.

Then the rabbi went on to say that he never read the certificate, and pointing to Adolph Mayer, who had sworn he wasn't there, said he had been a witness.

"This case is one long tissue of lies," commented the bench at one time, "and it is for me to sift it out and find out where the lies are."

Jacob Berman was the last witness. He swore he knew Mayers or Margolis in New York City, and that he had a wife and three children, and he also swore that that fact was known to Adolph Mayer.

Then Mr. Arnold began to cross-examine the witness in regard to his family matters. He asked him when his wife had died, and had gone so far as to ask him who the undertaker was who buried her, when Justice Clute said: "Surely, Mr. Arnold, you don't need to introduce the undertaker."
