NEW YORKERS SURPRISED IN CORALT

Richness of Silver Deposits
Beyond Expectations of
Men Well Informed on
Mining Matters.

HAILEIBURY. June 7.—Arrangements have been completed for the first electric railway in the north country. It is understood that all contracts were signed up last Saturday and that work has virtually been commenced, so the line will be ready to run in a few days. It will be operated by a 20-minute service, operated by an up-to-date electric railway.

A movement for a railway of this kind has been on foot for over two years, and the fact that it has at last materialized has caused the citizens to rejoice and be exceedingly glad.

HAILEYBURY, June 17.—Arrangements have been completed for the first electric railway in the north country. It is understood that all contracts were signed up last Saturday and that work has virtually been commenced, so that the line from Haileybury to Cobalt will soon be connected by a 20 minute service, operated by an up-to-date electric railway.

A move toward a railway of this sort has been on foot for over two years, and the fact that it has at last materialized has caused the citizens to rejoice and be exceedingly glad.

It is planned to lay down the track from Haileybury to Cobalt, a distance of 10 miles, and will be finished about Oct. 1. Owing to the fact that a franchise could not be obtained to enter Cobalt, the company were considerably set back in their plans, and had to purchase the surface rights from some of the mine owners in that place and the difficulty has been thus surmounted.

The best arrangement can be made if the business is put into operation. It has been impossible to secure the full list of directors, but the committee has been able to interview Americans and Canadians, most of whom now have their residence in Cobalt. Cobalt, therefore, it is called the Nipissing Centre of the world.

A number of articles have appeared in The World of late setting forth the great resources of the district, its lines of trade, and more especially as a door to South Lorrain. Now that the railway will be practically assured, Cobalt will be a business centre, but not only as a business centre, but also as a residential section for the better class of people.

With respect to Cobalt as a business town, it must be admitted that so far as residences are concerned it is not conducive to the health of the community.

Halesbury is the natural city of the north; its streets are well laid out and its buildings are of a high standard of excellence, and what is more, the sanitary conditions are the best.

As far as the railway is concerned, Cobalt on the T. & O. is now very heavy, but with the new railway in

operation the two towns will in all probability experience a greater run of traffic at all hours of the day.

There can be no doubt that if any town is to be the centre of trade for the river region, Halleybury is to be the one. South Lorrain is steadily opening up and scarcely a day goes by but a new find is reported on some property there. And not alone South Lorrain, but Maple Mountain and even Glenora may some day look to Halleybury as their best supply point, and thus is shown another of the town's great possibilities.
