**16 HOURS IN SMALL BOAT**  
**IN WILD SUPERIOR STORM**  
**Crew of the Barge "Ottawa"**  
**Underwent Great Hardship and**  
**Peril—How Wreck Occurred.**

CALLUMET, Mich., Nov. 17.—The  
 steel barge grain carrier "Ottawa,"  
 lost in Lake Superior on Monday, was  
 valued at \$150,000, covered by insurance.
