DISCORD OVER PIANOS CONCERT CALLED OFF

Mark Hambourg Will Come Back in April—A Strange Incident—Board of Health Meeting

HAMILTON, Feb. 25.—(Special).—Miss Jeanette Lewis brought Mark Hambourg to Hamilton this evening to give a concert in the Grand Opera House in aid of the Sick Children's Hospital fund. The performance had to be cancelled because of a dispute as to the make of piano to be used. One firm claimed that it had a contract that no instrument except its make may be used in the opera house, while the pianist had a contract to use another kind. The matter could not be adjusted, and the concert was called off. Mr. Hambourg will give a concert next afternoon. Board of Health.
The executive of the board this evening roared the board of control for cutting down the board's appropriation from \$5010 to \$5800. William Farrar accused Mayor McLaren of being influenced by politics in making the salary increases. He found particular fault because the salary of W. Calder, caretaker at Barton Reservoir, had been cut while \$100 had been added to that of the "drone" at the filtering basins. He said the board should appoint a food inspector if the law would permit. Another point on which he found fault was because Dr. Roberts had not been voted an increase. The board will ask council to grant \$7500, which will include an increase of \$300 to Dr. Roberts and the employment of another inspector. The board will not allow the expenses of the dog catching brigade to be taken out of its appropriation.

The executive of the Trades and Labor Council passed a resolution protesting against the controllers in structing the city solicitor to collect costs from James Smith, the workman, who brought the suit which freed the city from the Cataract power contract.

Rev. R. E. Knowles was the speaker at the evening session of the Hamilton Teachers' Institute convention. He said he felt quite confident that Rev. E. B. Lancelotti, who had been reported as saying that teachers who were brought for money were like bartenders, had been misrepresented.

The Conservative Club held its annual concert and old folks at home entertainment this evening.

A Mysterious Shock.
At 10:30 to-night the city was visited by something that was regarded as an earthquake. Houses in some parts of the city shook so that people ran out in alarm. The shock was accompanied by a noise as if from a heavy explosion.

NAVY IN WARD ONE

Conservatives Urge Government to Give Dreadnoughts.

That the supreme object of Canadian participation in naval defence should be to increase the common strength of the empire, and to promote its unity; and that to forward this movement contributions should be immediately sent to Britain sufficient to build two or more warships of the latest Dreadnought type, was a resolution unanimously passed at a large and enthusiastic meeting of the Ward One Conservative Association last night to discuss the naval policy of the Dominion Government.

A. E. Kemp, the chairman, in opening the meeting said that he believed a crisis was impending between Britain and Germany, and the latter power had an eye on the rich colonies that Britain possessed. It was, therefore, only fair that Canada, which had prospered greatly under British protection should do her utmost to contribute to the national defence. Martin Burrell, M.P., for Yale, said that the Conservative party had to push Laurier to make any move in the national defence scheme. The premier had always been antagonistic to any move to help the mother country. Sir Wilfrid did not represent the people, and this was the reason that the Conservative party had become a party question. To the members of the present government there is no danger of war with Germany, and in case of war the statements made by the prominent British statesmen to the contrary, they still continue to hold back.

W. B. Northrup, M.P., declared that the proposed navy was never intended to fight, but was built with the idea of preying on the German commerce in case of war. He was followed by R. A. Norman, M.L.A., and R. S. Neville, K.C.

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D.R.A. ANNUAL MEETING

Col. Hughes Again President—Commitments to Blesley Team.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—At the annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association held in the railway committee rooms of the commons to-day, Col. Sam Hughes, M.P., was again elected president.

There were but few changes in the list of other officers and of their clubs. Lieut.-Col. Davidson of Prince Edward Island, Col. Cruickshank of Alberta, and Col. G. W. Wynn of Saskatchewan, were elected vice-presidents for their respective provinces. Capt. Birdwhistle of Ottawa was again elected secretary, and Major E. D. Sutherland, treasurer.

As a compliment to the great work of the Blesley team in 1909, Col. Berram, the commander, of Dundas, Ont., and Major M. S. Mercer, the adjutant, Toronto, were made life members of the association.

Earl Grey, in acknowledging a vote of thanks, said: "We are all compatriots, and united in loyalty to an empire of which Canada is destined to become so great a part. My heart is thoroughly Canadian, and I have not had a single unhappy day since I came to Canada."

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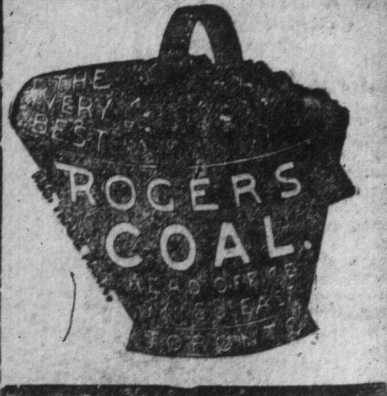
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
