WANT NEW FRUIT MARKET BUILT AT BAYSIDE PARK

Fruit Men and Committee of Aldermen Agree That Present Accommodation is Inadequate.

"In the opinion of the fruitgrowers of Ontario and Huron counties the time has arrived when the City of Toronto should have an adequate fruit market, open on equal terms to all the transportation companies running into Toronto."

The foregoing resolution was passed unanimously yesterday afternoon at a joint meeting in the city hall of representative fruit men and a special committee of the city council.

Ald. Foster, as mover of the motion under which the committee was appointed, was chairman, and Controller Hubbell, Ald. Chisholm and Ald. Lyth were present. Fruitgrowers in attendance were: William Armstrong and H. St. C. Fisher, both of Queenston, Ont.; W. L. Butcher, St. Catharines; L. Hamilton, Clarkson, and P. W. Hodgett, secretary of the Fruitgrowers' Association, who has a law office at Toronto; Charles Kempton, Thomas Vance, R. W. Husband and David Spence appeared for the local dealers. Addresses were made by nearly all the visitors, in which the importance of the fruit trade to Toronto was urged. There was unanimity in declaring that the present accommodation at the Scott-street market was inadequate, and that all transportation companies should have equal facilities. The consensus of opinion was that a permanent market, to be kept open the year round, should be established at Bayside Park and a revenue of from 12 to 15 per cent. on the outlay was promised. It was pointed out that the proposed location was convenient for marine as well as railway traffic. The growers claimed that fruit suffered materially from being densely packed and roughly handled.

Property Commissioner Harris urged that Bayside Park would be a suitable place for a night line of fruit steamers, to arrive at Toronto between 5 a.m. and 6 a.m., would considerably increase the facilities.

After the resolution had been carried, it was decided, on motion of Ald. Chisholm, to have Mr. Hadris report on a suitable location, style and cost for the proposed market.

Tuberculosis in Milk.
At the meeting of the local board of health a request was received from the health board of London, Ontario, the Toronto body co-operate in applying for legislation to allow such bodies through Ontario to prohibit the marketing for the application of the tuberculosis test to cows giving milk. Dr. Sheard said that, while the movement was, generally speaking, a good one, there was no particular need of it in Toronto. It was therefore decided not to take any further action.

It was stated by Dr. Sheard that, while the board's estimates for 1907 had been exceeded by \$400 because of the smallpox outbreak, the board had sufficient revenue to cover the item. The meeting being the final one for the year, resolutions of thanks to Chairman Ald. Church and Dr. Sheard were passed.

Work on Sewer.
The city engineer says the work cannot be begun on the Indian-road sewer until the beginning of next week, despite the fact that the injunction asked for by the National Trust has been refused, and the works department can now proceed with the undertaking by day labor. The stay in the proceedings has caused a rearrangement in Mr. Rust's plans, but the pick and shovel brigade can start in on Monday.

The board of control yesterday decided to have a deputation go to Ottawa at the resumption of the session of the parliament in January to look after the city's interests in regard to the Hamilton Radial Railway Bill.

This decision was reached yesterday as the result of a despatch from Ottawa that the company was seeking to enter the city via High Park.

Mr. Gibson says the company is willing to agree to any additional terms that the city council may demand.

Poor Outlets Come in.
The mayor reported that the House of Industry had advised him that poor people were being sent in from outside places to get food and lodging in Toronto. The board agreed that the practice should be stopped.

There was a lively rush among unemployed of all nationalities to the residence bureau in St. Andrew's market when it was opened yesterday. About 600 names were taken down by Registrar John Gardner. Nearly four-fifths of the applicants were English-speaking, the remainder being Italians, Russians, Jews and Poles. They will be given work in the order of their applications, as speedily as the city can supply it.

The mayor will make another effort to settle the differences between the striking machinists and their employers.

A large owl has been presented to the Riverdale Zoo by George E. Berwick of Shelburne.

HOTELKEEPER BLAMED

Should Not Have Allowed Johnson to Go Home Intoxicated.

RIDGETOWN, Dec. 18.—(Special.)—That Duncan Johnson died in his buggy from suffocation is the verdict of the coroner's jury to-day. The jury also finds that Patrick Collins, hotelkeeper at Mulrick, and Roy Green, the latter having rode with deceased, were guilty of carelessness. Dr. Lake, who performed the post-mortem, found that Johnson's face had been muffled by his overcoat while intoxicated, and that he had died from suffocation.

Crown Attorney Smith of Chatham argued that the hotelkeeper should not have allowed the man to start home in such a condition of intoxication.

Two Months in Jail.
PETERBORO, Dec. 18.—(Special.)—Charles Miller, who broke into the residence of T. Brightman about a week ago and stole \$50 worth of jewelry, was this morning given two months in jail.

Prof. Sheppard, a palmitist, was arrested on the charge of pursuing an illicit traffic. The charge of seduction is also preferred against him.

Collingwood Protest.
Collingwood Remonstrators protested to Hon. W. J. Hanna yesterday against the submission of a bylaw to raise the license fee in their town to \$2500. Local opinion was almost carried at last election, and it is feared that the trade is in danger.

ACQUIT VICE-PRESIDENT MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE

Judge Says That He Should Not Be Held Criminally Liable.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Alfred E. Smith, vice-president of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Co., was acquitted to-day of a charge of manslaughter in the third degree, brought in connection with the wreck of the Brewster express at Woodlawn last February, in which 24 persons were killed.

Justice Kellogg held that it was humanly impossible for the defendant to have personal oversight over the road's entire trackage and that no criminal negligence on his part had been shown.

The accident occurred Feb. 16 on a sharp curve near Woodlawn-road bridge. It was asserted that the train was being driven at an excessive speed by an engineer of insufficient experience. The prosecution claimed that Smith was responsible in permitting this.

CAUGHT DAYLIGHT ROBBERS.

Police Find Over Fifteen Thousand Dollars' Worth of Loot.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Four young men and women suspected of numerous daylight burglaries were arrested to-day. Over \$15,000 worth of jewelry, lace and other valuable wearing apparel found in their apartment on West 48th-street, was confiscated by the police.

According to the authorities, the men, who gave the names of David Cillman and George Carr, entered the rear windows of apartment houses throughout the city by means of ropes strung from the roofs. They were worked at meal time, it is stated, and are generally mistaken for window cleaners. The men, with their wives, were arraigned in the Tombs court on charges of robbery and were held without bail.

THE CIVIC CAMPAIGN.

Majority Candidates Geary and Nesbitt Are Busily Organizing.

Ald. Geary held a majority organization meeting at Sheridan's Hall last night, David Spence presiding. He will hold three public meetings in the east, centre and west of the city next week.

Dr. Nesbitt last night held organization meetings on Euclid-avenue, East Queen-street and Morse-st. He will hold two more such meetings to-night.

Controller Ward is again looming up as a majority candidate.

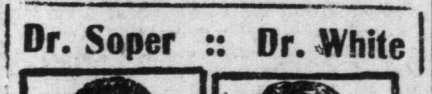

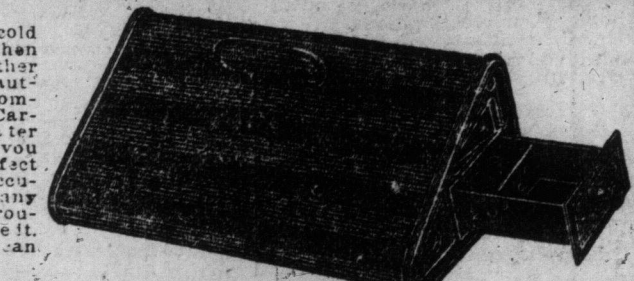
