MAKES SENSATIONAL EXIT.

Ben of New York Banker Ends Life in London Hotel.

London, Nov. 29.—Elverson Chapman, aged 23, whose home is in New York City, committed suicide last night at the Carlton Hotel by throwing himself from the third floor landing to the vestibule, where he was shockingly mangled on the marble floor. His skull was crushed, one arm was shattered, from which there were other injuries, from which he died in terrible agony within a few minutes.

The management of the hotel suspected his mind was unhinged and detained a man to watch him. He was a son of Dr. R. Chapman, banker of New York, and had recently graduated from Oxford.

President Stevens of W.C.T.U. Urges Watchfulness.

Philadelphia, Nov. 29.—In his address before the W.C.T.U. convention, Mrs. Stevens made a number of recommendations, urging vigorous measures against various legislative measures against the sale of liquor and opium. WEED DISTRIBUTION.
Some of the Means of Dissemination of These Nuisances.

A recent paper issued by the agricultural department, Ottawa, says: All weeds are disseminated by means of their seeds, while a considerable number also multiply through the medium of underground root stems. Among the latest weeds which have been introduced into Canada are the Canada Thistle, Perennial Sow Thistle, Bindweed, Shepherd's Purse and others. When a new weed is discovered, it is a good plan to examine into its habits of growth and means of reproduction and dissemination, and to see if there is more information to the farmer than the mere name of the weed.

Weeds that depend for reproduction upon their seed alone produce them in large numbers. A single plant of flax will mature from twenty-five to thirty thousand seeds, and also we sometimes have reason to doubt the vitality of the seed of corn or mangels that we buy; we need have no misgivings as to the vitality of these seeds. The seed of these weeds last mature in our grain, crops, even though they are not in the field, is with a density induced to germinate at a time when the grain is in the field.
