With nine geldings out of a list of ineteen entries for the King's Plate, nineteen entries for the King's Flate, it may be doubted if the premium so handsomely given by His Majesty the King along with the four thousand dollars added by the O. J. C. is accomplishing its object in the best possible way and to the greatest possible extent. Some years ago geldings were allowed to be entered and to start for the Epsom Derby, the most famous race the world know out on an unsexed one and a halfbred at that, proving dangerous and actually running second, the condition were altered so as to exclude emas culated animals for the future. It is question whether it would not be worth while to change the terms under which the King's Plate is run in the same way. The entries would be fewer in but it would gain in dignity were it limited to entire horses and mares. Further, prior to starting, the intend-ing competitors should be subject to veterinary inspection and a certificate of hereditary soundness lodged with

the secretary of the club.

An Objection.

It will possibly be argued that breeders and owners would be encouraged to keep worthless animals entire. That is an objection worthy it is one that should not weigh against and the giving of His Majesty's pre-mium. Geldings have possibly wor royal plates in the past even in Eng-land, but that day has gone and the prizes given now are for animals that can perpetuate their species and not for poor creatures whose ultimate doom is the huckster's cart or the knacker's yard. It is hardly likely that ony one of the lot will prove formidable and it is more than probable that probable that the majority will be absentees, but that state of things does not help matters. The trouble is that their future usefulness is gone and that they exist only for private pleasure or gain, which is not helping the horse industry to any material extent. Therefore it might be as well if the whole lot were eliminated even of the race should thereby lose much

interest.
The List As a Whole. Taking it all round the list of entries does not appear worthy of the big purse. On the contrary it rather seems that the winner will carry off a deal more than his own worth, and that suggests the suggestion that taking all in all the race is a bit top heavy in value. and that were the added money cut in half the second portion might be used to greater advantage without interfering to any material extent with the race itself. When the event was of a good deal less value it attracted quite as many entries and horses of equally as much quality. Twelve and thirteen years ago only a thousand dollars was added by the club, but he would be a bold man who would venture to say that the large fields that faced the flag in those days were not every bit as good as those that will face the barrier in this year of grace in an effort to win three or four times that amount.
