COLONIAL REPRESENTATION.

On the motion for going into a Committee upon the Bill.

Mr. H. A. rose to submit an important motion to the House, connected with the measure. He referred to the great importance of the colonial interests, and those who were acquainted with the nature, extent, population, and wealth of the colonies, naturally inquired whether they were not entitled to Representatives in Parliament.

The population of British India amounted to 80,000,000, and its wealth and resources were incalculable. There were besides 14 colonies, including the Canaries, containing a large population and most extensive resources. He asked the House why so important a portion of the King's dominions as the colonies, important both as regards their population and their resources, should not be represented in the House of Commons.
