2,000 PEOPLE VISIT ORPHANAGE FAIR ON CLOSING NIGHT

Several Drawings Take Place Friday Evening—The Winners

Close to 2,000 people attended the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage fair on the closing night last evening and there was a brisk business in all of the games. Practically everything in the way of stores was disposed of, the small amount of supplies remaining will all be taken to the home and used at the orphanage.

The drawings, with the exception of the model yacht, the hope chest and the automobile, all took place last evening and the crowd was much interested. While the objective of the fair was to clear the \$20,000 deficit the committee in charge can only roughly estimate the total proceeds, but has placed them at about \$8,000 or \$10,000 behind that amount and since it has the pledge of two good friends of the orphanage to each give \$1,000, if the proceeds amount to nearly the objective, the committee has appealed for any of the people who are able to do so to assist with further money contributions to wipe out the debt. One man in response to that appeal last night gave a pledge of \$100.

The workers at the fair have won highest praise for the devotion with which they carried through a very arduous task. Among the workers who have already been mentioned are the members of the K. K. Club, a war time organization whose initial letters stand for "Kitchen and Knit."


