N. S. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL DUE TO SAVE SELF

Only One Member In Upper House Expected To Favor Abolition

HALIFAX, N. S., March 3.—An indication of the fate awaiting Premier Rhodes' bill to abolish the Legislative Council, when it reaches that body after passing through the Lower House, was given yesterday.

Hon. Neil Gillis, moving the resolution of which he gave notice previously, declaring the council a useless body and one that should be retained, said that he had entered the council with the expressed intention of adhering to this policy of abolition when that question came up for consideration. He had changed his views, however, after sitting in the House and realizing what a useful institution the council was, and he had come to believe that the legislative council would justify its existence.

ECONOMY QUESTION.

Hon. A. S. Macmillan declared the only reason for abolition advanced by Premier Rhodes during private conversations with the council, had been the financial consideration. He said that the Premier had told the council when he appeared before the members with a proposal for abolition, that were it not for the necessity for commencing the work of the council, it would be continued to the present system.

STANDS ALONE.

Hon. Mr. Bligh moved adjournment of the debate on Mr. Gillis' resolution, indicating that he would continue when the bill came up from the Lower House.

Hon. Mr. Bligh remarked that he was likely to be the only member to vote against the resolution, adding that Hon. W. H. Owen, the only other Conservative appointee, had been a member since 1922, had indicated his intention to vote in support of the resolution to retain the council.
