Suffers Loss of 2 1/4 Points
From Yesterday; 1,720
Shares Sold

Buying Stimulated Chiefly in
Merchandise and Chain

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—A loss of
two and a quarter points by Canada
Steamships preferred, featured the
opening of trading on the Montreal

Stock Exchange this morning. This
issue opened with an overnight loss of
1 1/4 points and later eased to 57 1/4, on a
turnover of 1,720 shares in the first
half hour. The balance of the market
was firm, with the exception of Belgis,
that issue being off two points, at 95.

IN WALL STREET
NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Stock prices
followed an upward trend at the opening
of today's market, with buying
stimulated by reports of expanding
trade, particularly in the merchandise
and chain store fields. U. S. Steel
resumed its advance following publication
of its favorable third quarter earnings,
and initial gains of 1 to 3 points were
recorded by United Drug, United
Cigar Stores, Sears Roebuck, Chrysler,
General Motors and Dupont.

POSITION GOOD BUT BUSINESS SLUMPS

Canada Steamships President
Denies Rumored Arrange-
ment With Besco.

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—No announcement has been forthcoming from
yesterday's meeting of the directors of
the Canada Steamships Lines. President
Coverdale, in discussing the company's
situation, merely stated that the
expectations outlined by him in his talk
some weeks ago, had been realized. He
stated that the company at the present
time, was about half a million ahead of
its net position a year ago and that
liquid conditions remained very com-
fortable. He stated, however, that at
present, the company was experiencing
a slump in business.

Mr. Coverdale took occasion to deny
rumors that recently had currency, to
the effect that an arrangement
might be made between Canada
Steamships Lines and British Empire
Steel Corporation with respect to the
New Brunswick trade.

One hundred thousand people fewer
than the city of Belfast. The climate
is admirable, and the soil
is well adapted for agriculture. The
settlement is coming a country already
developed, there being always farms
in various stages of improvement to
be purchased in the settled portion, as
well as large tracts of land in the
Crown Lands which can be obtained
by the man without capital under the
Labor Act; while those with limited
capital can acquire farms under the
Farm Settlement Board, particulars
of which can be had from the
Department of the Interior, Ottawa,
or from the Provincial Government at
Fredericton. It is not difficult for any
man, let his circumstances be what
they may, to obtain a farm in New
Brunswick, and it is a source of wonder
that why so many people have
gone West, when in New Brunswick
one is in the midst of most of the
amenities of life. It is that geography
again. The province is a side-tracked
on the map and too often overlooked.
NEW BRUNSWICK INDUSTRIES.
The industries of New Brunswick
are varied and the latest is the export
of sardines which are competing suc-
cessfully in Europe with the Nor-
wegian brands. There are millions of
forest lands untouched in the interior,
one stretch north of the southwest
corner of the province, and another
long, being still without a habitation,
save for the lumbermen's or trappers'
shanty. We heard complaints in the
Maritime of the slaughter of the
off of young trees in other parts, which,
if well founded, should be met by a
condition imposed in some places that
no tree be cut down until it has been
planted. To the eyes of the visiting
journalists there seemed to be ample
room for development in dairying and
stock raising. Ayrshire cattle are es-
pecially adapted to the conditions.
Poultry raising, bee-keeping, fruit-
growing, potato cultivation (seven
million bushels of potatoes are pro-
duced annually) and other lines all
capable of expansion, provided settlers
come along. There is considerable
coal-mining in various parts, an estimate
placing the contents of the coal fields
at 151,000,000 metric tons. Gypsum
is also an important mineral,
while south of the rising hills of the
Moncton natural gas and petroleum
are obtained. Oil shale, tungsten, cop-
per, iron, antimony, nickel, manganese,
lead, bismuth, are all found, and are
not yet worked on any great scale.
The country is teeming with latent
water power, only a limited portion of
which has been developed. Its fisheries
are most valuable, and the oyster beds
are the largest in Canada. Nearly
three million dollars' worth of fish is
landed annually. Fur farming is now
on a stable basis, while the entire pro-
vince is a joy to the sportsman. Rail-
way communication is greater per head
of population than in any other part
of Canada. East of Manitoba roads are
rapidly improving since the advent of
the motor, which has revolutionized
travel in Canada. There are over
5,000 bridges in use, four and a half
million dollars having been expended
on steel structures since 1895. Tele-
graph and phone facilities are excel-
lent, the farmer in the most remote
district getting connection to his local
exchange for fifteen dollars a year.

Progress during the last 40 years has
been gradual, but geographical condi-
tions operate adversely, and it all
comes back to Premier Baxter's as-
sertion quoted at the beginning of this
article. Whether or not it is true
that the Maritimes have not received
their due share of attention from
Ottawa is not for the passing writer
to say, but he has ample evidence to
convince him that the Maritimes are
going to make their voices heard more
than they have done in the past.
