## Deck As Waves Sweep Vessel

New York, Oct. 13—Lashed to ring bolts in the deck of the dismasted barkentine John S. Emery of Boston, Captain E. H. Davis and his crew of nine drifted for three days through pounding seas before being picked up by the liner Samland,

For the last twelve hours on board the barkentine, the crew was out of food. Only the lashings kept them from being washed overboard, as every wave passed over the stripped deck. When the storm subsided somewhat for a brief period, the men distilled some water in an old copper kettle, lighting a fire with an emery wheel, cotton waste and gunpowder from a cartridge. When picked up the crew had almost no clothing
