FROM JENNY LIND TO GERALDINE FARRAR

They all do it sooner or later. Jenny Lind, when at the height of her fame and popularity, left the opera house for the concert hall, chiefly because she was a real artist who wanted of singing all the time in the same opera, not all of them of the highest class. Lillian Norda, Emma Eames, Maudie Smith, Alma Gluck, Frieda Hempel, Schumann-Heink, all turned their backs prematurely to the opera and took to singing the lyric and dramatic songs of the great masters. And now Geraldine Farrar joins the procession, much to the surprise and dismay of thousands who do not see how they can get along without shouting team over her. Buttery, Zaza, her Marguerite or Manon, or being thrilled by her Navarraise or Carmen or Louise.

Their loss will be the pain of thousands who will hear her on her concert tour next season, which will cover the whole country. But how can one who has been, next to Caruso and Jean de Reszle, the best paid opera singer of recent decades voluntarily give up such an honorable and profitable position? Well, the prima donna just mentioned found they could earn a good deal more in the concert halls, thanks to their operatic prestige. Mrs. Farrar can easily better her Metropolitan income by \$100,000 a season. It is doubtful, however, if that was her chief motive in deciding to leave the Metropolitan. The lure of lyric song is great! It calls for a finer, more subtle art than the opera does, as a rule. By her recital programmes in recent years and by her volume of "Favorable Songs" she has shown that she naturally gravitates towards real masterpieces. Artistic treats of the highest class are therefore in store for those who will hear her in the concert halls, all the more as her voice has, for reasons known to her friends but not yet made public, been recently rejuvenated in an astonishing manner. Operagoers will hope that she will return to the Metropolitan, as she did once before after a year's absence. Probably she will. La donna e mobile—particularly in prima donna. It may be said, in conclusion, that the Metropolitan needs her more than she needs the Metropolitan.
